amendments had ruined the bill. In moving that the senate not concur Senator Eddy said: "And my motion does not include the appointment of a conference committee." The bill provided, among other things, for increased compensation, a three-day waiting period after injury before compensation would begin, and for arbitration by a board of physicians to determine the degree of injury. There were also other changes considered important. All that the house amendments left was the increased compensation, which, Eddy said, was impossible unless the other changes were also made.

The senate concurred in the house amendments to senate bill 814, by Senator Moser and Representative Angell, providing for the appropriation of property for streets and other purposes, applying particularly to street widening in Portland.

Hall on Emergency Board Senator Charles Hall was appointed by President Marks as the senate member of the state emergency board which is reorganized by a bill passed at this session. By the change the governor, the secretary of state and the state treasurer are replaced by two members of the house and one of the senate. The presiding officers of the two houses and the two ways and means committee chairman remain on the board as at present.

After a debate the senate refused

to pass a bill introduced by Representative Hamilton, Delap, Orman, Taylor and Norton providing for a commission to promote agricultural and tourist development in Oregon and appropriating \$50,000.

The ways and means committee bill, farthered mainly by Senator Charles K. Spaulding, appropriating \$146,500 for improvements and elimination of fire hazards at the penitentiary, was passed.

any damages that may be collected by such persons as a result of their injuries. With senate amendments the representative reapportionment bill passed the senate. It takes one representative from Washington county. As amended on the senate Grant and Harney are made a district with on representative in each, Grant, Harney and Lake, while Lake is joined with Deschutes with one representative. The house refused to concur and the matter was laid on the table.

The state tax base is protected by house joint resolution 9, adopted by the senate, which provides that under the 6 per cent limitation the tax levy of any year may be based on the levy of any one of the last three previous years, and not necessarily on the last year.

A bill providing that in event of a vacancy in either house, such will be filled by members of the county court in the county in which the vacancy exists, subject to confirmation by a majority vote, at roll call, of the house in which the vacancy existed was passed by the house. The appointee would serve until the next regular biennial election.

Stink bombs are "out" and hurlers, if convicted, will be "in" for two years in prison, the house voicing hearty approval to the senate committee on revision of law bill prohibiting the use of stink bombs.

Both houses during the day acted upon more than fifty measures, while considerable time was taken up by committee reports, action on amendments to bills already passed, and

last day resolutions, the latter last including the per diem expenditures for clerical hire. The total number of bills introduced stood at 806, of which 352 were senate bills and 453 house measures.

With the adjournment on the 53rd day of the session, the 1931 legislature sets a record for endurance. Records in the secretary of state's office show that the present period has been the longest in recent history of the state, the 1929 session being the closest approach with 7 overtime days. The Oregon legislature is officially limited to 40 days.
