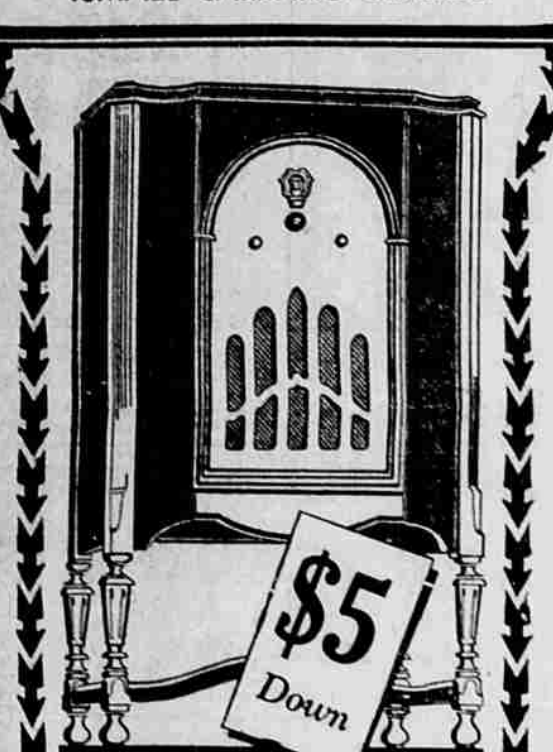
Now the heavyweights are entangled in a round robin of contracts that are gradually taking on the appearance of the documents that guaranteed Harry Wills a title shot in so many places.

Health Talks

THE FIRST AID KIT

In every office, shop, factory and home it is a wise precaution to have a first aid kit.

In industrial establishments there should be a responsible person who knows how properly to apply first aid measures.

The first aid kit should be used exclusively for first aid and should not be borrowed for any common purposes. Its various elements should be replaced as used up.

The National Affiliated Safety Organizations list the following as the standard units of the first aid kit: One tourniquet for use in stopping serious hemorrhages; a pair of scissors; a pair of tweezers for general use and for removal of foreign bodies; one triangular sling for a variety of uses explained in every popular volume of first aid instructions; 12 assorted safety pins; one teaspoon; one metal cup; one medicine glass with indications on it showing various medicinal measures; two medicine droppers; three paper drinking cups.

In addition, the kit should contain the following medicines: one two-ounce bottle of castor oil; one three-ounce tube of burn ointment; one two-ounce bottle of 3 per cent tincture of iodine; one two-ounce bottle of 4 per cent solution of boric acid; one two-ounce bottle of aromatic spirits of ammonia; one two-ounce bottle of Jamaica ginger.

Bandage material should include a piece of flannel 24x36 inches; a roll of absorbent cotton; ten yards of three-inch gauze bandage; five yards one-inch adhesive tape and several packages of sealed sterile gauze measuring approximately 6x6 inches.

In addition, when the first aid kit is for office or factory use, there should also be available a wire gauze splint for use in case of fractures, and first aid record cards.

Use for Old Calendar

Wool Market Steady But Mohair Is Dull

BOSTON, Mar. 6 (AP)—The Commercial Bulletin tomorrow will say: "There is rather more business being done in wool this week in spots in the market, with the demand chiefly for fine, half-blood and three-eighths grade, which have hardly changed for the week."

"Wools are steady, as also are waxes, which are growing rather scarcer."

"The foreign markets are up again this week slightly as compared with last week and show a general average advance since the first of the year of quite 15 per cent, while this market has mainly stood still or in the case of medium wools eased off a bit further."

"The manufacturing position is fairly encouraging, because it is healthy but there is no boom market in sight."

"In the west a little business is being done in consignments of small clips here and there."

"Mohair is dull and still with prices hardly more than nominal."

Butter And Egg Market Weak In Portland Today

PORTLAND, Mar. 6 (AP)—While wholesale butter and egg quotations opened unchanged in Portland today, the butter market was barely steady with slow demand for the rather light volume of receipts and the egg market continued weak and unsettled by clutterings of under-grade eggs. Receipts were liberal and trade activity only fair.

Country dressed meat and poultry dealers were selling veal at 14 cents a pound, 1/2 cent decline, as supplies gained on demand. A few pekin ducks springs were in on a basis of 30 to 35 cents for weights 4 pounds or over. While old pekings were quoted 24-25 cents.

Arrival of first California asparagus, fine quality, featured opening of the fresh fruit and vegetable market. Quotations were set at 15-20 cents a pound.

Cauliflower was quoted about 10 cents higher as demand showed good snap. Supplies, by rail and truck, from Roseburg, were ample and of excellent quality. Quote: \$1.45-\$1.50 crate. Dealers were rejoiced that Roseburg cauliflower growers have discarded the small crate in favor of the larger U. S. standard crate this season.

New green peas were offering at \$4.50 a hamper.

Government news service reported: "A practically unanimous agreement yesterday, whereby remaining unsold stocks will be held for 50 cents per cwt., plus sacks. This is in contrast to recent sales of 100 per cent."

Three hundred carloads or more are affected by this agreement.

Retail apple sales in Portland's downtown office and factory buildings by the unemployed are netting very encouraging returns to the sellers, some of whom are distributing 2 to 3 boxes of apples per day. Large ripe Hood River Spitzenberg are being featured in this movement.
