### Police School Is Opened In Salem

SALEM, March 9 (AP)—Luke S. May, Seattle, consulting criminologist, opened the six-day police school for the state of Oregon today with an address on "recognition, preservation and presentation of criminal evidence." The second annual school, conducted by the Willamette university college of law, is being held in the senate chamber of the state capitol.

About two hundred police officers, sheriffs, constables, and those preparing to become law enforcement officials attended the opening day, while additional registrations are expected for preceding days. The school will continue through Saturday.

In a gesture of horror, Bowles showed no emotion.

Mrs. Bowles was stabbed to death in the kitchen of Miss Loucks' apartment, in the presence of the girl and Bowles. The defense contends she killed herself when her husband's unfaithfulness became known to her. Bowles leaned forward over the shoulders of his attorney to study the sweater and other garments his wife wore on the day of her death. He displayed a casual interest. Miss Loucks held one of her hands tightly clasped in the other and stared unseeing at the clothing.

It was in the opening statements that the first hint came of the importance placed by both state and defense on the circumstance that the brown sweater was not cut by the thrust of the knife.

Prosecutor George Mowry declared this point would fit into the state's theory of premeditated murder, as pointing to a struggle in which the woman's sweater was pulled out of shape. John Collier, of the defense, on the other hand, stressed the matter as a pertinent part of his suicide version.

Mowry also mentioned that the sweater was not dampened by the cold compresses which Bowles and Miss Loucks say they applied to the wound before the doctor came. He hinted the state may attempt to prove that Mrs. Bowles was not wearing the sweater when she came to the apartment. It was on her body when officials investigated.

apparently been removed was considered important in early days of the investigation.

In cross-examination Tackaberry testified the knife was dry when he saw it. He said what he took to be blood marks were on the saw-toothed blade.

Thirteen jurors, one of them an alternate, faced the defendants today as the trial entered its second week.

Francis Sibler, regular juror, was stricken with influenza last night and his place was taken today by Frank W. Jackson, one of the two alternates.

Sibler was the second juror to be excused for illness. Philip Porter was confined to his home after being accepted for cause. Should two more jurors be dismissed for illness or any other reason, a mistrial would have to be declared.

**Special Care of Jurors.**  
Because all the jurors used to outdoor life, physicians said the sedentary duty at which they are now engaged may cause others to become ill. To guard against this they will be given but two meals a day and will take long walks under the guard of balliffs.

The prosecution today resumed its task of constructing a ground-work upon which to build the circumstances of the case by which it expects to convict the Portland millionaire and his ex-typist.

Police Detective William Williams was the first witness called. There was no sign of disorder in the kitchen of Miss Loucks' apartment in which Mrs. Bowles was stabbed to death, the detective testified. The back door, he said, was locked and bolted from the inside. On the drainboard was a bread-knife with a saw-toothed edge—the blade which, pierced Mrs. Bowles' breast. He found three blood spots in the kitchen, he testified. One was near the base of the drainboard, another near the entrance to the kitchen, and the other near the threshold of the back door.

Questioned as to wound, Williams said he viewed Mrs. Bowles' body at the mortuary. He was questioned by the prosecutor as to the position of the wound and whether it was hidden by a slip-sweater the woman wore.

The detective said the knife wound was visible at the edge of the sweater band "just the least little edge was out from under the neck band."

### STORMS, SNOW, EARTHQUAKES BRING DEATH

Saco, Maine, 100 feet to the south. Tons of rocks were washed over beach roads in the vicinity. Lashing the Atlantic seaboard from the Carolinas to the tip of Maine, a snow-laden gale left in its wake today death, injuries and property damage.

Starting Saturday night and continuing unabated through most of Sunday, snow and rain centered their fury on New York state and on New England. Seven were killed in New York City in automobile accidents attributable to the storm. Four were killed in an automobile accident at West Haven, Conn., and three at Glens Falls, N. Y. Many were hurt by falling signs, trees and telephone poles. Long stretches of waterfront were gnawed away on Long Island and summer homes were swept out to sea.

**Children Endangered.**  
The snow in New York City melted as fast as it came. The roof of a Bronx church was torn off, endangering the lives of 200 children. Lighting systems were wrenched out of order. The Jersey meadows were transformed into lakes through which trains solaced cautiously. The tide rose almost to the top of the Battery sea wall for the first time in many years.

A snow storm laid a white mantle over Northern New York—a deep as 8½ inches at Rochester. The storm

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swirled through the Adirondacks, blocking roads and stalling automobiles. Railroads had snow plows out north of Albany.

**Unemployed at Work**  
It was not entirely an ill wind, however, for the rain dropped billions of gallons of sorely needed water in New York City reservoirs and put snow shovels in the hands of impoverished men up-state.

Summer places on the Long Island Sound shore of Connecticut were damaged by water. In Middlefield, Mass., in the Berkshires snowdrifts ten feet deep in places blocked roads. Drifts in Vermont caused motorists to appeal for shelter.

The Balkan quakes Saturday and yesterday, extended from Eastern Yugoslavia across Bulgaria to the shores of the Black Sea. The epicenter was near Drama, Bulgaria. The quakes were felt in Greece, where 70 houses were destroyed in the village of Kavallion, and in Eastern Thrace and Adrinople. The more severe shock knocked the seismograph needles from the dials at the observatories here. Chimneys fell over the entire area.

**Relief Workers Busy**  
King Alexander and Premier General Zivkovich left here during the

day for Southern Siberia to superintend relief operations, which were already under way. Trains being sent out with food, shelters, medicines and drinking water. Before departing the king gave orders that such soldiers as had homes in the devastated area be allowed to return there at once and aid in caring for relatives.

Not one building was left standing in Pirava where 19 persons were killed. The bridge across the Parva between Skopje and Guevgeli collapsed, interrupting railroad traffic. In one village near Guevgeli there were 29 dead and 22 injured.
