The Romanesque period, which has been neglected, presents curious and wonderful decorations and architecture, members of the group state. Among the many examples of Romanesque architecture yet standing are the San Michele cathedral in Italy, an example of the Lombard-Romanesque; the cathedral group at Pisa, showing the Tuscan-Romanesque influence; the Abbey of Deshay, French-Romanesque; and Durham cathedral, Norman-Romanesque.
