the opinion of A. R. Hunter, La Grande, retired stockman, and legislator, who was a visitor at the Imperial yesterday. La Grande voted \$40,000 bonds three years ago to match a state appropriation, but had never issued the bonds. Mr. Hunter, as a champion of the welfare of La Grande, is a three-time loser on the armory proposition. Governor Pierce put the first veto on the armory bill. Governor Patterson followed with a second veto, and now Governor Meier has made it unanimous. Mr. Hunter, after spending ten years in the Oregon legislature and many years on the range, has learned the futility of bawling over the toppled milk pail. Over in the range country, Mr. Hunter says, the winter has been fine and the prospects for early spring range are excellent, but the price of beef is not so good.—Oregonian.

Speaks at E. O. N.—J. J. Handsaker, northwest secretary for the National Council for the Prevention of War, spoke this morning at the Eastern Oregon Normal school. He told of the day he spent with a German retired general who had had 37 years of military work.

Mr. Handsaker stated that the Austrian and German people, who he described the League of Nations, where he spent a time, stating that the greatest intellects of the world are at work. He quoted several authors who said "Another war will be the cemetery of our civilization." Mr. Handsaker believes that the League, with its philosophy of cooperation, has prevented eleven wars, and this is the first war that has tried to end wars, and now there are 63 nations in the League that want to end it, but there must be organized sentiment against war. Mr. Handsaker is making a series of talks in La Grande in the interest of world peace.

National Park Road Money Is Made Available

WASHINGTON, March 10 (AP)—Secretary Wilbur today approved allocation by the park service of its 1932 road fund of \$5,300,000 the bulk of which was appropriated by congress as a lump sum.

The money becomes available immediately, under provisions permitting its use to help relieve unemployment.

Director Albright submitted the allotments to Wilbur yesterday. Construction will be under the direction of the bureau of public roads and the park service.

Director Albright notified Thomas H. Macdonald, chief of the bureau of public roads, to undertake the projects immediately. Albright also notified P. A. Kittredge, chief engineer of the park service, at San Francisco, of the minor road program totaling \$762,700, which the park service will direct. This fund included:

Crater lake, for repairs, maintenance and equipment as well as construction \$49,300.
The fund will be divided for roads, trails, improvements, using rotenone and purchasing equipment and includes:
Crater lake, Oregon, 7.63 miles, \$406,600.
Lassen Volcanic park, California, road surfacing and oiling, 37 miles, \$167,240.
Mount Rainier, Washington, Stevens Canyon grading, one mile, \$175,000.
General Grant, California, highway across the park, \$75,000.
Yellowstone, Wyoming, grading and surfacing \$1.5 miles, \$1,189,000.
Yosemite, California, grading, oiling and maintenance, 75.45 miles, \$463,000.
More than \$5,000,000 in tidewater construction work is under way or in prospect in the vicinity of Norfolk, Va.
