**PORTLAND, Mar. 10 (AP)**—Steady prices ruled Portland wholesale fresh food markets Tuesday.

Butter receipts were light but sufficient for demand, with a steady tone.

In the fresh fruit and vegetable trade, small oranges were quoted 15 cents a case higher as supplies developed more limited than formerly. Government market news service reported:

Apparagus was plentiful, and demand was fair; but prices declined to 17-18c per lb. of best quality. California green peas are in slow demand, and sold cheaper. Local spinach was scarce today, and good quality continues to move readily at 90c @ \$1.00 per 20-lb. box. Volume of local spinach should soon be adequate to supply Portland's demands.

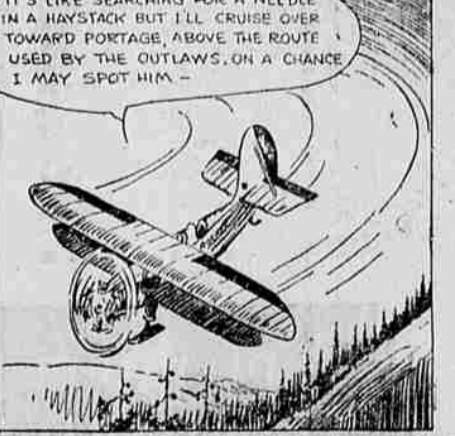
