The Garden
START EARLY CABBAGE PLANTS NOW
This is the season to get the seed of early cabbage started, either in hotbeds or in boxes in the house. Early cabbages are always a welcome mid-summer crop, either boiled or sliced and shred in salads and cole slaw. It is an all-season dish and green cabbage fresh from the garden is always finer flavored than the heads which have remained in storage for some time as finely as this vegetable keeps in winter seasons.

For the home garden, the crinkled dark green Savoy cabbages are the finest quality. They are a specialty for home gardens as their keeping quality is not to be compared with the more solid smooth type, although their taste quality is finer. Their period in the market is always brief. Sow a packet of seed of the Savoy cabbage if you have room for only a small cabbage patch.

Copenhagen Market and selected types of it and Jersey Wakefield are standard varieties of early cabbage. Golden Acre is a Copenhagen strain that has won much commendation. Charleston is a large strain of the Wakefield.

The cabbages want rich soil and should be set out as soon as the soil is workable, as the plants are hardy and won't mind a light frost should one happen along. The rows should be two feet apart with the plants a foot and a half apart. Between the rows an early vegetable such as radishes, spinach or lettuce, may be sown to be out of the way when the cabbages get into sizable growth.

While the cabbage is not a vegetable for the small garden, for garden of medium to large size a plot of sufficient size to furnish the family with fresh cabbage during the summer months may well be planted. The ravages of the cabbage worm discourage many gardeners who do not like to be annoyed by the constant warfare necessary to delete these voracious green offsprings of the white butterflies that hover over the patch.
