Report of Public Lands Committee Not Unanimous

WASHINGTON, Mar. 11 (AP)—Belief that the government's conservation policy would not be safeguarded under the plan prescribed for the transfer of public domain to the states prevented one member of President Hoover's public lands committee from signing its recommendations.

Members of the committee said yesterday that while W. B. Oresley of Seattle, former chief of the forest service, had approved of most of the provisions of the report he had refused to sign it because he believed the terms of the transfer failed properly to protect the conservation policy.

He was represented as objecting principally to the recommendation that conservation programs be based on uniform federal and state laws and that when the states adopted a uniform program resources should be transferred to them.

Members of the committee said that under the transfer plan, the government would retain title to sub-surface rights in known mineral areas, but that the states would be granted clear title to all rights in lands not now known to contain minerals.

The report called for classification of the remaining 178,000,000 acres of public land and reservation by the government of sub-surface rights in areas designated as mineral bearing.

New Commissioner Halts Power Tariff

SALEM, Mar. 11 (AP)—Brookings, a town in southern Curry county, is the first affected by an order from the new commissioner of public utilities, Charles M. Thomas, in office for ten days under an act of the legislature, replacing the three public service commissioners, announced that the new tariff of the Brookings water service company was suspended for ninety days pending an investigation.

Tax Assessors Hear Pleas at The Dalles

THE DALLES, Ore., Mar. 11 (AP)—Eastern Oregon tax assessors concluded a two-day convention here last night. The session Monday was marked by pleas from wheat and stock ranch owners for relief from the tax burden on their lands. This taxation was characterized as nearing the confiscatory stage.

Charles V. Galloway, state tax commissioner, declared taxpayers must pay greater attention to the budgeting of local tax levies. He said the greater part of the tax burden results from local taxation, and that every effort will be made by his department to maintain on the statute books the income, intangibles and excise taxes. Revenues from these taxes, he said, will enable the department to eliminate from real property all taxes for state purposes.

Crashing Autos Kill Innocent Bystander

PORTLAND, Ore., Mar. 11 (AP)—Joseph Kincaid, 60, an innocent bystander, was taken to a hospital here yesterday suffering from fractured ribs and severe bruises, the result of an automobile crash.

He was walking along the sidewalk when a car driven by George Phillips collided with one operated by H. E. Smith. Smith's car was struck on the side and knocked 35 feet across the intersection and up over the curb. Kincaid was crushed against the side of a building.

Both Phillips and Smith were arrested on reckless driving charges.

Ask Modernizing of Columbia Highway

THE DALLES, Ore., Mar. 11 (AP)—With communities from Arlington to Cascade Locks represented, the director of the Greater Columbia River Highway association met here Monday night to further plans for modernizing the highway from The Dalles to Portland. E. O. Blanchard, Hood River banker, presided. David C. Glass, representative from this county in the state legislature, was named to prepare a brief to be presented to the state highway commission.

Among other things the association will urge a 32-foot roadway on straightaways, and 38 feet on curves.

California Cities Continue Gas War

SAN FRANCISCO, Mar. 11 (AP)—Reverberations from the gasoline price explosion which rocked the Pacific coast the last two weeks were current in California yesterday with Fresno Independent Owners' league condemning the crude oil price fall.

Los Angeles independent dealers continued selling gasoline at from eight to 10 1/2 cents. In a few isolated instances fuel could be purchased for five cents a gallon. Major concerns maintained the 12 1/2 cent quotation, a reduction of seven and one-half cents with two weeks.

Eleven and twelve cent gasoline prevailed at San Francisco independent stations, while major concerns here sold at 16 cents.

CHEYENNE, Wyo., Mar. 11 (AP)—The office of the general superintendent of the north division of the Union Pacific railroad with headquarters here, will be abolished March 15, it was announced here yesterday. Work at the office will be consolidated with that of the general manager at Omaha, Neb. The north division extends from Omaha to Ogden, Utah.
