The code was once defeated by the senate, but passed upon reconsideration after amendments eliminated objectionable features. The bill was further amended in the house.

WICKERSHAM SAYS REPORT FAVORS WETS

The bill of 63 pages provides a new code for game and fishing regulations. The first salary bill approved was that increasing the annual salary of the state labor commissioner from \$3000 to \$3800, requested because of the added duties of the office by the consolidation of the child labor commission and the industrial welfare commission under the bureau of labor. Other bills included the pawnbrokers' license provision, appropriations for the Oregon national guard and Camp Clatsop; organization and regulation of fire insurance companies, regulation of health and accident insurance and an inquiry into a fire-proof vault at the state capitol, appropriation of \$3,900,550 for 11 state institutions, the bill creating the state university, consolidation and appropriations for homes for neglected children and wayward girls.
