**GAS PRICE IS
DOWN A CENT
ALONG COAST**

SAN FRANCISCO, Mar. 12 (AP)—One cent a gallon reduction in the price of gasoline at Standard Stations, Inc., retailing organization of the Standard Oil Company of California, throughout Oregon, Washington and California, were in effect today.

In San Francisco down to fourteen cents a gallon; in Los Angeles 11½ cents; Portland, 17½ cents and Seattle 14½ cents.

The reduction, they said, was made to compete with independent concerns selling motor fuel from 12 to 13 cents a gallon. The one cent cut was foreshadowed yesterday by a two cent cut in tank truck prices.

WASHINGTON, Mar. 12 (AP)—Chairman Stone of the farm board estimated today the domestic carry-over of wheat on July 1 will be 275,000,000 bushels, the same as last year.

SAN FRANCISCO, Mar. 12 (AP)—Trans-America corporation earned 79 cents a share in 1930, compared with 22.92 in 1929. Total earnings were \$18,597,000, compared with \$7,214,000. Dividends of \$1.45 were paid in cash and 4 per cent in stock. Adverse securities markets limited earnings from stock sales to \$2,091,000.

**PRICE STEADY
TODAY; TONE
IN EGGS WEAK**

PORTLAND, Mar. 12 (AP)—Fresh produce markets opened at about steady prices today.

Ton of the butter market was steady with receipts larger and trade of fair volume with interest centered on 89-90 score cubes.

Egg market continued weak with demand not enough to absorb liberal receipts. Though quotations were unchanged sales were forced at irregular prices.

Fresh fruit and vegetable market conditions were reported by the government market news service as follows: Lettuce receipts and team-track holdings of fresh fruits and vegetables this week, are the heaviest in several months, with 65-80 carloads present at all times.

Letting receipts are liberal, with ordinary quality predominating. Sales to retailers range from \$2.50-3.50 per crate of 4-5 dozen heads, depending upon quality.

Washington Winesap apples are starting to move in volume, at Portland. C grade holdings of all varieties are firm, due to the heavy demand for these cheaper sorts during the entire winter season; and this is reflected in slight advances in Winesaps. Several hundred boxes are now being received weekly via motor-truck.

Trans-America late yesterday offered intercoast trading share-holders the opportunity to exchange of stock, one share of Trans-America for 2 shares of Intercoast. There was a slight urge in favor of the exchange in the quotations of \$14.75 for "I. A." and \$7.25 for "I. C. T."

**FIGHTER FATALLY
INJURED IN RING**
PRESCOTT, Ariz., March 12 (AP)—Sam Terrin, Prescott prize fighter, was fatally injured last night when knocked out by John Henry, Phoenix negro middleweight.

Henry shot a lifer to the vicinity of Terrin's heart and a right to his jaw in the fourth round of their scheduled 10-round bout. Terrin crashed to the floor and died a few minutes later.

Henry was placed under technical suspension pending a coroner's inquest tomorrow.

FOUR PERSONS INJURED
SALEM, Mar. 12 (AP)—Four persons were injured last night when an Oregon stage of the Greyhound lines left the pavement near here. The driver reported inability to see after a passing car had splashed mud on the windshield, and the bus ran off the side and crashed against the bank.

Mrs. George Byron Milley, of Portland, was the more seriously injured. She was taken to a Salem hospital where it is believed her injuries will not prove critical. Three men, all of Portland, were treated for cuts and bruises. Traffic was held up for more than two hours by the accident.

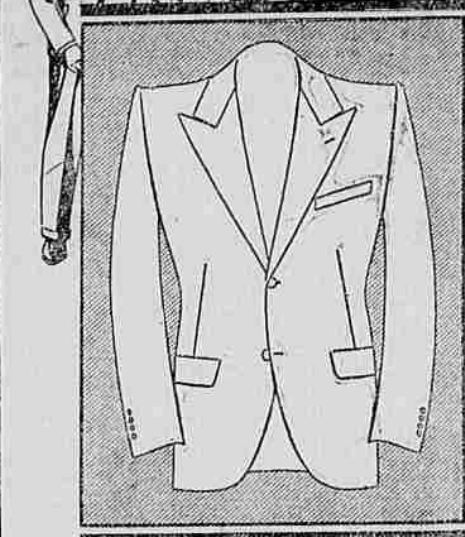
