PORTLAND, Ore., Mar. 13 (AP)—J. D. Ross, discharged manager of the Seattle light department, yesterday was asked by Ralph C. Clyde, Portland city commissioner, if he would consider "an attractive offer" to manage the "proposed" Portland municipal power plant.

The city recently filed for water rights for a municipal plant.

Clyde's telegram said: "Please advise if you would consider offer to come to Portland as manager of the proposed municipal power and light plant provided city council makes attractive offer. . . . I would be glad to take up the matter with city council looking toward availing ourselves of the advantage of your long and successful experience and knowledge of plant management."

After reading a copy of the wire, Mayor George L. Baker smiled. "Very interesting," he commented.

Bushman, who is appearing in a stock company in an outlying theatre, stipulated, however, that the woman must have enough money to support him in the manner to which he had been accustomed. He was not sanguine that one would be found as he set the figure at "one million dollars or more."

"The erstwhile movie lover gave his age as 47, his weight as 193 pounds, his height as 5 feet, 11 inches, and his health as perfect.

CHINESE ARSENAL TO BEAT SWORDS TO PLOWSHARES

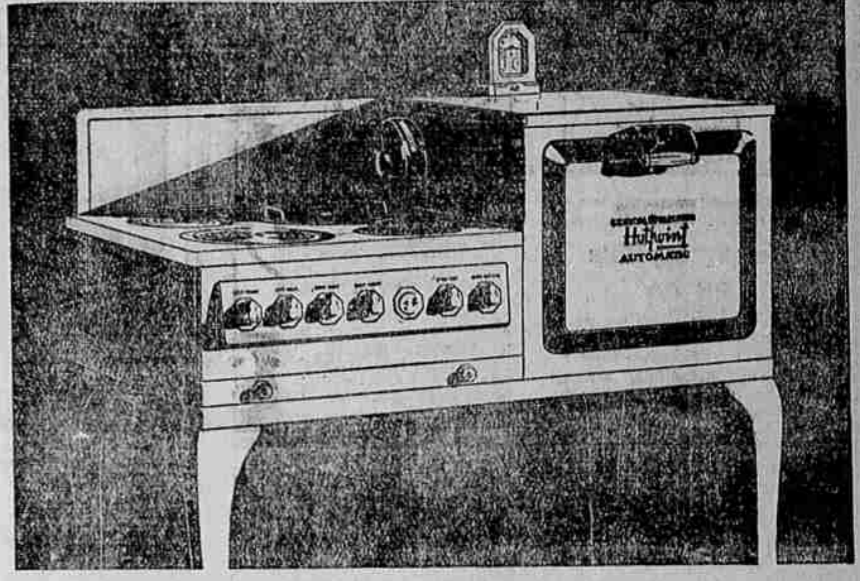

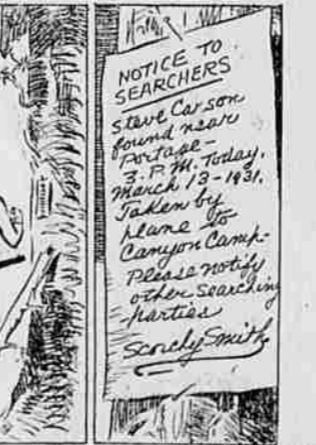
