Sacred Cantatas Being Arranged For Easter Day

Rev. F. W. Creighton, Bishop of Mexico, to Address St. Peter's Episcopal Church, Sunday.

Gladsome music will fill the air on Easter morning, April 5, for the churches as planning music, which will be both inspiring and uplifting. The Triad choir of the Presbyterian church, under the direction of Mrs. A. Richardson, is rehearsing for their cantata, augmented by men's voices to balance those of the women singers. W. W. Nussbaum is arranging a program of sacred music for the Methodist church.

In addition to the music, pastors of the various churches are arranging services. While the Episcopal and Lutheran churches are observing Lent, which lasts until Easter, the protestant churches will keep a joint observance of Holy Week, beginning March 30.

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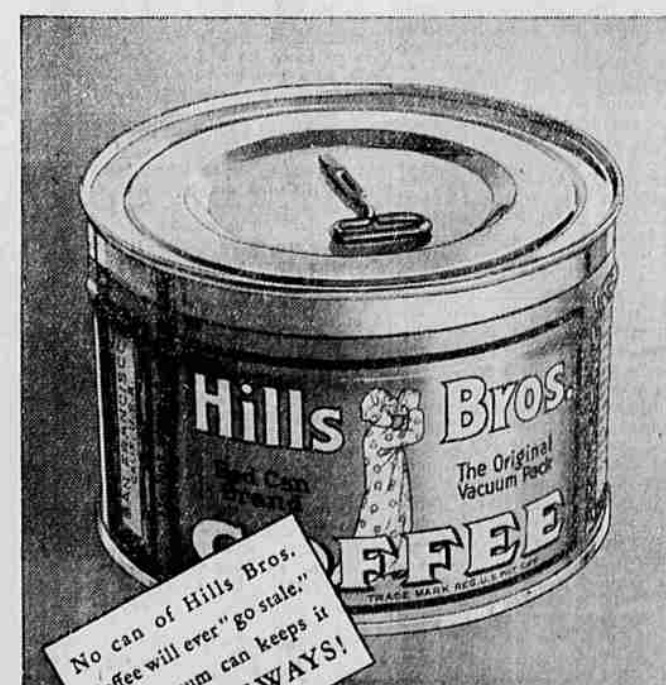
