Research Shows Better Times For Last Half of '31

SAN FRANCISCO, Mar. 17 (AP)—Recovery of business is ahead, and should bring the country to "a level of activity in many industries and in general buying power substantially higher than the present" in the final half of 1931, the current Silverburg research bulletin concludes after a detailed analysis of the current depression.

The business picture was likened to the 1893-1897 depression, which also had a forerunner a declining drift of commodity prices lingering as a result of war inflation, disturbances coming from vast new projects, low grain prices from over-expansion and competition of new sources, serious doubts as to the adequacy of the gold standard as the best solution of world monetary problems, and disturbed financial conditions in many foreign countries.

It was believed by Silverburg that the present unsettlement of the stock market caused by reductions in earnings and dividends would be temporary, and that the country would be able to show it has established a bottom there will follow an important revival in financial and business confidence.

Investigate Vice Charge In Portland

PORTLAND, Mar. 17 (AP)—A grand jury investigation of charges that police protection has been afforded gambling houses and vice resorts in the city will start here today, the district attorneys office announced yesterday.

Bob Swartz, special agent for the district attorney, said "a great deal of evidence has accumulated." He invited cooperation from the public, he said. "We are thus throwing the bars down in whatever other way we can to clear law-enforcing officials of suspicion."

Mussolini Halts Cities' Age-Old Levies at Gates

ROME (AP)—Jealousy-guarded heritage of the middle ages, municipal impost levied on goods entering or leaving in order of Mussolini.

Greece is left the only country of Europe where duties are still charged at the city gates on incoming shipments of goods.

One of the chief annoyances of American tourists in Italy has thus been removed. The traveler who has to pass through the gates of the open road no longer is stopped at the corporation line, his baggage examined, and duty imposed. And the merchant and farmer now pass directly into the city with their merchandise or vegetables without paying duty.

The city customs police have gone into other employment, and their little stations beside the road are abandoned. The customs police at the railroad stations have also disappeared.

The government has instituted a corporation tax to take the place of the old "octroi" or "dazio."

The list of objects formerly taxable at the boundaries of Rome filled a booklet of 20 pages. The list began with wine and ended with toys.

Meat was divided into three qualities, good, not-so-good, and frozen, which paid different rates. Household furniture, building materials, cloth, rubber, phonographs, umbrellas, bottles, hot water heaters, almost everything under the sun, was taxed.

AIR DEFENSE GUNS TRAIN ON PLANES AUTOMATICALLY

ANNISTON, Ala. (AP)—Field pieces that train on enemy aircraft automatically through aid of electric sound detectors are the latest development of the United States army.

The weapons are described by Major Gerald B. Robinson, executive officer, Sixth Coast Artillery, at Fort McPherson, as the latest in the aircraft defense. The guns are aimed with the use of range finders and are fired with greater rapidity than the old guns.

Tests have shown it possible to train the guns on planes 12 miles away.

The jury report said: "We, the grand jury for Jackson county, charged with the matter of the investigation of the death of Everett Dehach, have to report that upon

consideration of all the evidence before us, we find that such evidence is not such as, in our judgment, to warrant the indictments of any person or persons for the killing of Dehach. We are of the opinion that the raiders in the future be 'more careful' with firearms.

Dehach's relatives and friends requested Governor Norblad to appoint the special prosecutor.
