Prove Man Lived Before the First Glacial Period

CHICAGO, Mar. 19 (AP)—The field museum has apparent proof that man lived previous to the first glacial period. Handwork of the Pliocene man of a million years ago has been scooped out of a gravel deposit in England and placed in the museum's hall of prehistoric man.

The collection—composed of flint axes and scrapers—was unearthed by J. Reid Mair, British archaeologist, and was found below the "red crag"—or stratum deposited by the first glacier.

Henry Field, assistant curator of the museum, said the tools were about 1,000,000 years old—the approximate age of the famed Peking skull.

No bones of humans were found in the cache of tools—but the badly broken skeletons of whales, completely fossilized, were excavated.

Hoover and Borah Hold a Conference

WASHINGTON, Mar. 19 (AP)—President Hoover yesterday discussed with Senator Borah a long list of foreign and domestic questions at a luncheon conference at the White House.

The Idaho Republican said afterward at the capitol that subjects discussed included European and Latin American affairs, including the Russian question, disarmament, the naval treaty, Haiti and Nicaragua.

Among domestic questions discussed were farm relief, including operations of the farm board, and oil. Senator Borah was invited to the White House by Mr. Hoover and remained for an hour. He refused to interpret the president's reason for summoning him and would not comment on the outcome of the conference.

MURET HALSTED WHISLER

COVE, Ore., March 19 (AP)—Muret Whisler at the age of 62 years and six months has gone on into the beyond where the past four years of sickness and pain are forgotten.

His insatiable desire to travel led him from his native state, Indiana, into the south, the east and west, and pioneering in the Peace River valley in the northern part of the province of Alberta, Canada. During his illness he had the unique experience of a correspondence that represented friendships formed in the various states through which he had passed. Of these friendships none were dearer than those of the Grande Ronde valley of the state of Oregon. In the community of Cove where he but recently established his home did he experience a fuller knowledge of the richness of true neighborhood friendliness and companionship.
