

BAKER QUINTET WINS AT SALEM

Bulldogs Nose Out Monmouth 30 to 26 — Play Jefferson High Tonight

SALEM, March 19 (AP)—Two more high school basketball teams will be eliminated from championship aspirations in the second day of the state tournament held at the Willamette gymnasium, while two of the four who yesterday survived the initial combats, will also be displaced in the former brackets today.
The tournament today will see the first games of the Pendleton, Tillamook, Salem and Myrtle Point high schools.

The Portland High schools, along with Baker and Ashland, came out of their games on the long end of the score, although that end was rather short for Jefferson High and Baker. Astoria gave the Portland squad a hard fight, and the outcome of the game was in doubt until the final whistle, ending with a 33 to 28 score. Likewise did Monmouth come close to edging out Baker in the second game, the final score being 30 to 26. Benson High defeated Pleasant Hill, 35 to 19, while Ashland won from The Dalles 49 to 10.

Jefferson will play Baker tonight in the second round. Both have stellar performers on their teams. O'Neill, slingshotted forward, was second high scorer of the day, with 20 points. He did virtually all of the basket tossing for Baker, and did it neatly. Jefferson has three good basket leaders on its lineup, Clausen, Brown and Folen. They scored 26 points between them in yesterday's game.

Baker Eliminates Monmouth
A slightly built forward named Vernon O'Neill, who stood in the "hole" and dropped off a couple of shots, enabled Baker high school to defeat Monmouth, 30 to 26. The victory kept the Bulldogs, champions in district 1, in the battle for the Oregon state title. After an 8-11 tie in the first quarter Baker gained a lead it never relinquished.
Monmouth threatened often and twice was within two points of George Scott's quintet, but never headed the Eastern Oregon lads. Baker topped the count at the half with an 18-13 margin. In the third session the winners were out in front, 24 to 19.

SEATTLE, Wash., Mar. 19 (AP)—The winter boxing season in Seattle was closed last night with Benny Gallup, San Francisco featherweight and Joe Calder, Manila, boxing a torrid draw in the six round main event of the last show in the Crystal Pool. 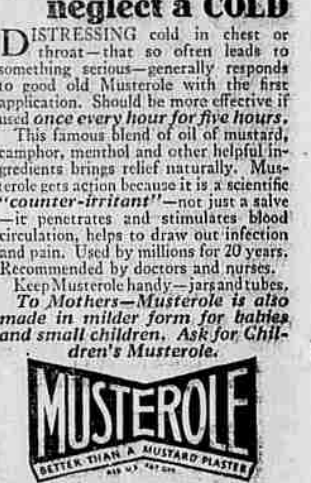
