

### JEFFERSON WINS FROM BULLDOGS

#### Baker Eliminated From Championship Play in State Tournament.

SALEM, March 20 (AP)—After a day of heart-breaking games, in which the victors were designated in the last minute of play by margins of one or two points, the state basketball tournament today goes into its third day, with the two championship semi-finals and four games in the consolation series on the schedule. It was a hard day for both winners and losers in the close contests, and one in which fans received more than the customary round of thrills. The game was played in two instances, and then only after a spirited battle and by a shade difference in score.

It was apparently Portland's time last night, both teams from the Oregon metropolis winning their games against the best teams of the far east, and from the far south of Oregon, but it had to fight every foot of the way, and never were the games "on ice." Both Baker and Ashland took the leads and held them the first period, at least, while Ashland led the second against Benson in the last few minutes of play. Jefferson won from Baker by ten points, 31 to 21, while Benson barely clipped Ashland by a lone field goal, the final score being 24 to 22.

**Bucks Play Jefferson Today**

Pendleton, in its first game had an easy time with Tillamook. The morning contest, to win the right to play Jefferson High in the afternoon game today, Pendleton has a fine line-up for the contest. The grueling match necessitated to win from Baker, Jefferson will go into the game with perhaps less pep. Salem had a harder time winning from Myrtle Point as did also Benson to defeat Ashland, to play the second game of the semi-finals.

Two teams were eliminated from further play yesterday in the consolation series. Monmouth put out by Astoria and Pleasant Hill by a margin of one point by The Dalles. These two games were close and more interest than most of the championship games up to last night's contests. In this series tomorrow Myrtle Point is given the edge over Tillamook, Astoria over The Dalles, while Baker and Ashland will have a hard game, with the dope giving Ashland the advantage. The victors of the Tillamook-Myrtle Point game and the Ashland-Baker tilt will play twice during the day ending up with a match against each other.

Up to Pendleton or Salem to break the winning streak of the Portland team. If these two aggregations are to be kept from meeting each other in the final, Portland will have to be accomplished during the day. Salem, with its star player, Kitchin, on the sick list, did not show to advantage yesterday, but may play a different type of game against stronger opposition. Myrtle Point failed to show any offensive threat, but the players checked close on a defensive play and held Salem down to a lower score than was expected.

In the night championship tilt the largest crowd of the present tournament sat through two hours of frenzied playing, and there was no leaving until the final gun of the last game was fired. It was a bill of fare, the kind which is seldom seen on any gymnasium floor in such short space of time.

**Baker Takes Early Lead**

In the first three minutes Baker took the lead over Jefferson and scored five points before Jefferson got underway. Shealey, Baker forward was largely responsible for this lead. The crowd went wild as the first period ended with a 7 to 5 lead for the eastern squad. Then Brown, Jefferson guard started his strong on forceful shooting and did not quit until he not only tied the score but forced his team into the lead, which was never overhauled by Baker. The passing work of the Baker players excelled in this game, while Jefferson had difficulty in locating the basket, throwing away shot after shot. The half ended 16 to 10 for Jefferson.

The third period was more even with Jefferson gaining another point to end it with a score of 26 to 19. It was during the last period that Baker again crawled up and came within striking distance of the Portlanders. The lead was too safe, however, and in the final minutes the gap was widened to 10 points, in which manner the game ended.

But if the fans thought the thrills of the evening were over, with their soon learned their mistake, as they had barely started. The Benson-Ashland contest did the rest, and the tied score for fully four minutes of the second game in the last period, had the cheering crowd on its feet.

Ashland started in the same manner as Baker had, taking the lead for a time by six points. Wense, Benson forward, tied the score by a free throw, after which he scored again to put his team into the lead. The

half ended 13 to 11 for Benson. One of the tied scores occurred in the third, when Reeder and Howell brought the score to 16, matching the Benson tally, but Benson again went into the lead, this time by four points and the third quarter ended 20 to 16. But Ashland was far from discouraged. Howell scored two more, to again tie the score, later taking the lead once more for a few seconds, with a goal after Reeder failed to connect. The crowd went into a frenzy and both teams were playing frantically for the advantage in the final moments. Heeler, Benson guard tied the score for Benson, after which the tie of 22 all remained until the last minute and a half. Courtney, right guard for Benson got away with a clear shot and put over the winning score. The game was over, but the crowd was still breathless when the gun was fired.

### This Game Of Golf

I ran across an odd little old book the other day—the proud possession of Frank Sampson of Astoria, who has taken up the study of golf-analysis.

Sampson has designed a huge chart or graph with black disks as a background for the player, with the disk so arranged that they are just back of the performer's head and hips. The alterations of position during the backward and forward swing are easily charted and measured by this means.

Bobby Pones' blond bean, for example, describes an almost perfect letter "S" in making a full shot; it moves backward with the backswing, forward as the down-swing gets under way, and then backward again at impact, finishing forward, of course, as the club sweeps through.

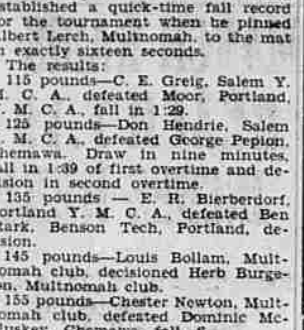
### BAKER PLAYER SECOND HIGH IN SCORING

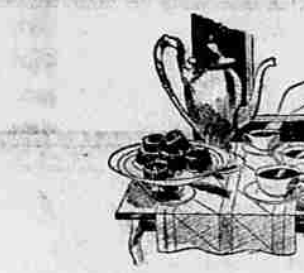
