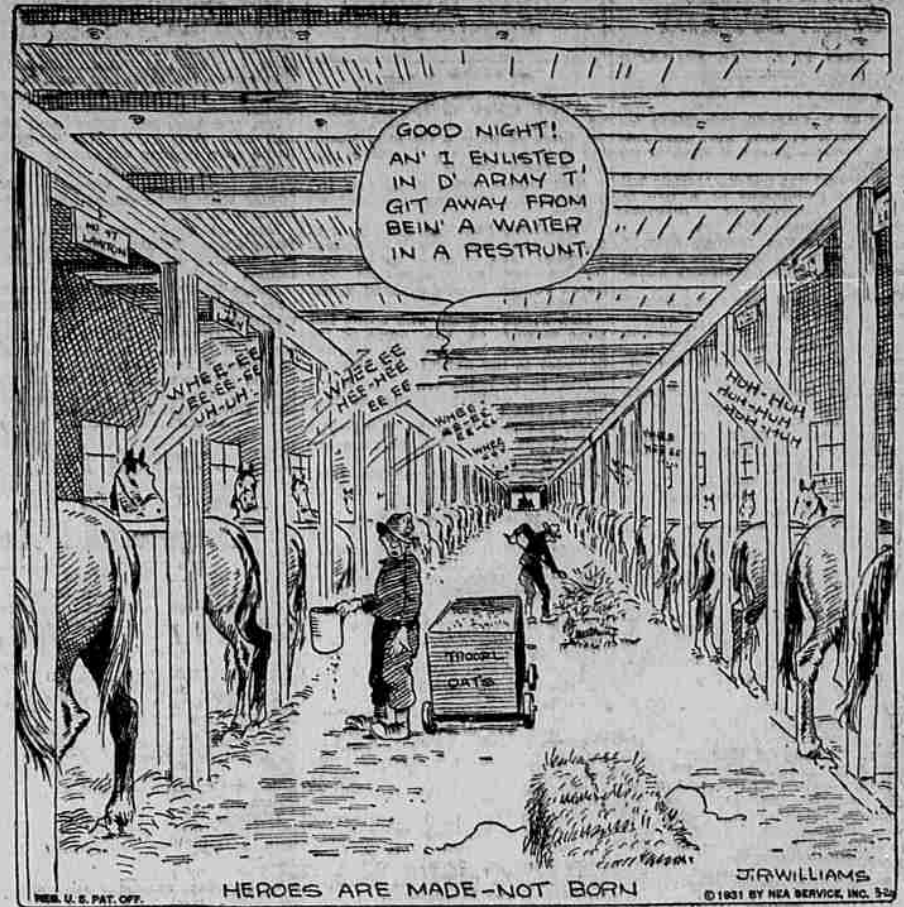

Suspend License Of Los Angeles Insurance Firm

SALEM, Mar. 21 (AP)—Suspension of the annual license and certificate of authority for the California Highway Exchange, of Los Angeles, to transact business in Oregon, affects many Oregon residents who are interested in this company. Clare A. Lee, state insurance commissioner, announced yesterday. The suspension will become effective March 25, after permitting the legal 10 days' notice for a hearing upon the order. The order was given out the first of this week by Lee.

Lee based his action upon information received from Insurance Commissioner E. Forrest Mitchell of California as a result of an examination made of the company last December. The examination, Lee said, reveals an apparent deficiency of \$890,718.28 in

liabilities over assets, and the company's certificate has been suspended in that state. Notices of assessments have been served upon subscribers by Mitchell.

The California Highway Indemnity Exchange has not filed its annual report with the Oregon insurance department for the year 1930. The report for 1929 shows that the company collected net premiums on automobile coverage in Oregon amounting to \$60,345 and paid \$52,533 in losses in Oregon.
