ARMADA OF 672 PLANES WILL WAGE MIMIC BATTLES OVER EASTERN CITIES

By Oscar Leving (Associated Press Staff Editor) WASHINGTON, D.C.—An aerial armada that will appear in flight as a wings 20 miles long is preparing to strike for the annual air corps field exercises in May.

A squadron of a full war-time air armada of 672 planes will have 870 men, comprising in size and composition, 740 officers, and all equipped with the latest in air materiel.

The division will form in the middle of May at Dayton, O. After 10 days of preparation and combat practice with flight demonstrations over Chicago and Detroit, it will travel in a broken mass to arrive May 21 in New York.

Starting on next night with a bomber attack on the city near midnight operations will be carried on for two days. The attack will end on May 23 when the entire force will fly in combat formation for the dedication of Floyd Bennett Field, New York's new municipal airport.

The division will be reformed the next day in up-state New York, to fly in column down the Hudson river and past the massed ranks of West Point cadets.

Admission City, Trenton, Jersey City, and Newark will be attended by the army May 27, and two days later it will move over Philadelphia and Baltimore for the final maneuvers over Washington Memorial day.
