LONDON (AP)—Few are the girls in England who aren't envious of little Sari Maritzka. For Sari has been smitten upon by Charlie Chaplin—and perches have scrambled for Charlie's smiles. Before that she was just one of many British film actresses hoping for a break.

She was one of Chaplin's guests at the opening of his new picture here, and at the swanky party he gave afterwards she came and singled her out for a solo tango with him. It is rumored, of course, that she will be his next leading lady. But Chaplin hasn't said anything about it, and Sari insists it hasn't even been discussed.

She was born in Tientsin, China, where her father was director of mining properties and educated in England and Switzerland. Last year she had the lead in "Greek Street," a British picture. She speaks French, German and Chinese, likes to ride and is a medalist swimmer. Sari, a blond with gray-blue eyes, 5 feet 1 inch tall, is only 20 now.

She got started in films when a director saw a picture of her which Sari says made her look "baby-faced." Her nickname is "Sally."

partment or enterprise to another on account of services. The totals include all payments for the year whether made from current revenues or from proceeds of bond issues.

The total revenue receipts were \$20,694,222, or \$27.82 per capita. This was \$10,074,783 more than the total payments of the year, exclusive of the payments for permanent improvements, and \$2,961,515 more than the total payments including those for permanent improvements.

The total funded or fixed debt outstanding September 30, 1929 was \$61,851,261. Of this amount \$30,061,750 was for highways.

The net indebtedness (funded or fixed debt less sinking fund assets) was \$31,889,638, or \$32.71 per capita. In 1928 the per capita net debt was \$36.78, and in 1917, \$0.66.

The assessed valuation of property in Oregon subject to ad valorem taxation was \$1,122,232,180; the amount of state taxes levied was \$5,048,883; and the per capita levy, \$6.03. In 1928 the per capita levy was \$5.93, and in 1917, \$3.16.

All Oregon To Benefit As Result Of National Advertising Campaign

PORTLAND, Ore., March 18 — All Oregon rather than a few communities will profit from the exploitation program planned by On-to-Oregon, Inc., and the Portland chamber of commerce, it is pointed out by O. W. Miller, president of the former organization, and L. C. Newlands, president of the Portland chamber.

The schedule of space advertising now appearing in national magazines draws attention to the state's recreational and tourist assets as a whole rather than centralizing on any one area. The follow up literature which the Portland chamber is sending out in response to inquiries from advertising agents a picture of attractions to be found all over Oregon.

A four-page spread in the March 21 issue of the Saturday Evening Post calling attention to the entire Pacific coast and devoting a quarter share to Oregon in pictures and print will be seen by at least 10,262,655 readers. It is estimated by On-to-Oregon of the state that the greatest possible results may be obtained from it.

The Portland chamber will continue its practice of turning agricultural inquiries over to the Oregon state chamber of commerce for answer. It will also continue turning over to various local chambers of the state inquiries concerning their particular communities.

It is estimated that a total of nearly 73,000,000 readers will see On-to-Oregon advertising appeals in national publications and newspapers this spring and summer.

If but a small percentage of these readers are induced to make a trip to Oregon, we will have a tremendous tourist influx this year, commented Mr. Newlands, president of the Portland chamber. "And Oregon is fortunately situated to profit from tourist between California and Washington and British Columbia."

The South Atlantic league was launched April 26, 1904, with the pennant the first two years. Several of these were unable to re-enter this year on account of financial worries, and officials declared the league could not go on.
