Tourists Spend Large Sums In State in 1930

During the year of 1930, 93,141 tourists registered at the chamber of commerce offices in Oregon, and of this number, 60 per cent were non-resident cars. The total registered and unregistered tourist cars is figured at 155,235. Estimating 3.5 passengers per car, this means that 543,322—well over half a million—persons visited Oregon via the highways last year. Further estimating that two-thirds of the tourists are hotel patrons and that they average \$7.50 per day in each town in which they stop, something like \$2,716,612.50 was spent in Oregon by these tourists. Also, the other third—camp patrons averaging \$3.50 a day—spent about \$633,871. A combined total of \$3,350,483. According to Harold Boone, secretary of the chamber, the average stay of the tourist in the state is seven days and state figures estimate \$23,543,384.50 was spent in Oregon.

The figures for La Grande, estimating that 25 per cent of the tourists travel the Old Oregon Trail highway, are 38,809 cars and 135,381 persons. If held in La Grande one day they would spend \$339,624. It is estimated that 60,000 Oregon residents make trips each year, and taking outside tourist percentages of the Oregon Trail travel, it is figured that 15,000 home tourists went through La Grande last year. If held one day they would leave \$922,500. If 25 per cent of these tourists stopped one day in La Grande they would spend approximately \$233,031. The figures show. They were compiled by the tourist traffic committee and its members believe that if the tourist program succeeds locally that it will become a very worthwhile "enterprise."

DEATH RIDES THE SKIES

LOS ANGELES, March 23 (AP)—Death rode the skies here Sunday afternoon, wrecking two pleasure craft and taking a toll of four lives within a period of 20 minutes.

The first to crash were Wilbert Wadleigh, 35, writer of numerous air and western stories, and his wife, Lorene Wadleigh, 32. They rented an open biplane at United airport to take pictures. Wadleigh said his wife would take the controls as soon as they were off the ground and witnesses said they believed the ship got out of control while the change was being made.

Aline Miller, 22, saleswoman employed by the Emeco Aircraft company, took Ivan de Villiers, 40, motion picture airplane stunt flier, for a pleasure hop from Grand Central terminal. They were about 400 feet up when the plane sideslipped and

At Santa Barbara, 80 miles north of here, Marjorie Durant, daughter of W. C. Durant, automobile manufacturer, Dr. N. H. Brush, physician for Stanley McCormick, millionaire, and their pilot were badly shaken when the airplane in which they were riding broke through an air field fence and fell into a shallow barranca.

PORTLAND GIRL KILLED

CORNING, Cal., March 23 (AP)—A verdict that Miss Helen Penstamacher, 19, of Portland, died from concussion of the brain caused by an automobile accident, was returned by the coroner's jury here investigating the accident in which the University of Oregon girl was killed.

Miss Penstamacher was fatally injured, Miss Bernice Williamson, 19, of Berkeley, was seriously hurt, and two men, W. E. Johnson Jr., 25, and William Reed, 21, both of San Francisco, escaped unhurt when their automobile overturned.
