It was due to this scattering of Hellenic culture throughout Western Asia that, when evil days fell upon Euro, and most of the remains of Greece glory were forgotten or destroyed, traces of that once great culture survived, often in out-of-the-way places.

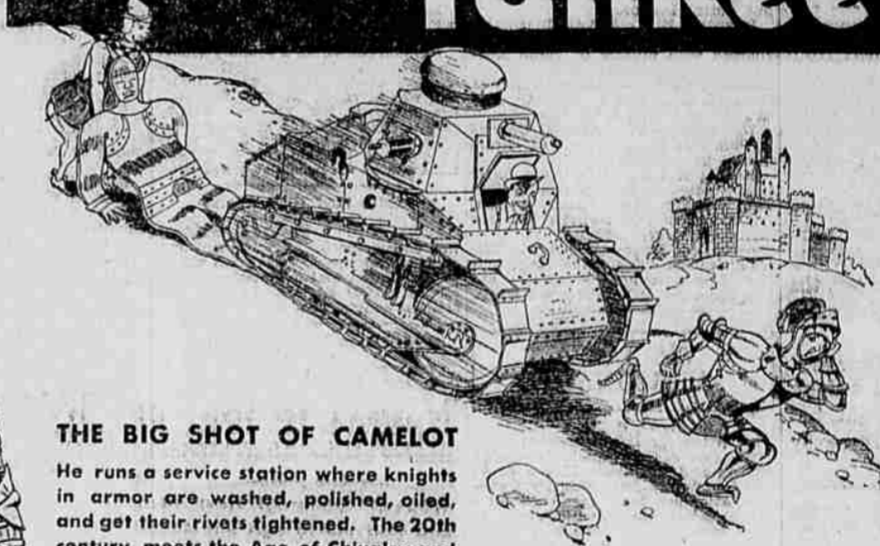

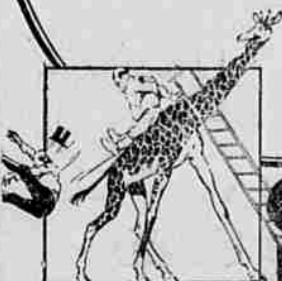
