\$24,450,000 Is To Be Expended On Roads In Wash.

OLYMPIA, Wash., March 25 (AP)—The acts of the 1931 Washington legislature stood as a completed record today with the filing last yesterday by Governor Hartley with the secretary of state of the omnibus and supplemental appropriations measure.

The three bills were reserved until today by the governor for executive action. Only one item, the sum of \$400,000 for a sea wall in Seattle, was trimmed by executive veto from the highway bill. The rest approximately \$24,450,000 for construction and maintenance of state roads during the coming biennium.

The omnibus appropriations bill which amounted originally to \$52,000,000 was cut only \$20,000. Nearly half of this reduction was due to the veto of the personal and corporate income tax bills, as the sum of \$100,000 was appropriated by the legislature for the administration of the laws.

The supplemental appropriations bill was reduced drastically by the governor to approximately \$1,000,000, or less than half the original amount appropriated. The reduction was due primarily to the elimination of \$1,100,000 intended for the purchase of five new motor vehicles for the state police.

Among bills approved by the governor was the \$1 flat automobile license fee law with two cent increase in the gas tax, making a total tax of five cents. The increased gas tax charges become effective April 1 and the lower license fee January 1.

The legislators passed a total of 211 bills, the lowest number of bills passed at any recent 60-day session. Of the 211 bills, the governor vetoed 69 outright and approved 138 measures in full. Four other measures, including the highway and the lower license fee, were vetoed in part, the major portions of the bills being allowed to stand as laws.

Coin Dots, Pin Checks In Gay Spring Frocks

PARIS (AP)—Prints as gay as picture books color many of the frocks and ensembles which Miss 1931 will wear this spring.

The variations of the patterned mode range from coin dots and tiny checks to flowered and geometric designs flashing with color or toned to subdued shades. The evening mode is replete with sprawling flowered patterns, but daytime frocks feature microscopic designs. Many of the prints tell a story in their design.

Most of the day frocks are made with peplums and tiers, finished with wavy belts of plain or printed material and white lingerie collars and cuffs.

There are red and white coin dots, brown and beige pin checks, and scores of dark blue crepes and foulards patterned with gay small figures or white flowers. Black and white prints, designed with hip-length or long tunics, are often left without touch of color, finished simply by a patent leather belt.

A number of the printed frocks are designed with the new short sleeves, but most of them, relying on their printed pattern for interest, are made with wrist-length sleeves.

Street ensembles are often designed with printed frocks and dark coats lined with the same printed pattern. A white crepe dress patterned in tiny blue-grey and crimson conventional dolls had a dark blue velvet coat; a frock of mulberry print on white crepe is accompanied by a close-fitting mulberry wool coat; a dress patterned with blue, yellow and dark green leaves is worn with a dark green coat. All of these ensemble coats are lined with material matching the frock.
