When Should Youth Pick Career? After College, Say Money-Makers

P. O. Official Short More Than \$8,000

ASTORIA, Ore., Mar. 25 (AP)—Postmaster Charles Haldeman announced yesterday an audit of the books of H. F. Peacock, missing assistant postmaster, had been completed and the total shortage was found to be \$8,000.50. Peacock was under a \$5,000 bond. His properties in Astoria and Warrenton have been attached by Haldeman and are believed to be of sufficient value to cover the balance of the shortage.

No further clues to Peacock's whereabouts have been developed since the finding of his abandoned automobile Saturday morning on Toussaint street. Shortly before leaving Astoria he drew several hundred dollars from his personal bank account. An intensive search is being conducted by federal officials for the missing postoffice official.

Another finding states: "Study of the scholastic records of these successful men and of their present incomes indicates that there is practically no relation between scholarship and financial success."

However money-making evidently is only part of the qualifications which future men will need, for they must also have:

"Knowledge gained from books is regarded as the most valuable item in the college experience of these successful alumni."

Eighty per cent of those gaining outstanding success had been singled out for "some kind of distinction as college students."

NEW YORK, Mar. 25 (AP)—Yesterday's contribution to the great Theodore Dreiser-Sinclair Lewis controversy comes from Dr. Paul de Kruif, co-author with Lewis of "Arrowsmith."

"At no time," said the biologist, did I offer the scientific material later used in "Arrowsmith" to Mr. Dreiser."

It was the actor's first voyage, and the crossing from Havre to Plymouth was rough. M. St. Granier was seasick. At Plymouth he declined to continue the voyage and went ashore on the lighter.

Indian Fighter Is Dead at Age of 80

CHARLESTON, W. Va., Mar. 25 (AP)—Marcus P. Dume, 80, to whom "Custer's Last Stand" was something more than an incident in American history, is dead here.

Dume, an Indian fighter of the early 70's, was a member of one of the detachments that arrived too late to prevent the massacre of the Little Big Horn, Montana, in 1876, when General George A. Custer and his men were wiped out by Sioux Indians.

City Asks Ritchie To Be Candidate

BALTIMORE, Md., Mar. 25 (AP)—Governor Ritchie was requested to become a candidate for president of the United States in a resolution adopted by the city council last night.

Approval of the measure, similar to one adopted by the state legislature, March 1, did not come until there had been considerable debate. The vote was 9 to 6 with one Republican supporting the proposal.
