## Price Declines Registered In Spinach, 'Grass

PORTLAND, Mar. 25 (AP)—Although wholesale egg quotations remained unchanged today actual prices in many transactions were at shaded prices in efforts to move liberal receipts of eggs not fit for storage. Also direct producer to retailer sales added unmet demand to the price situation.

Butter market opened steady but rather quiet at unchanged quotations. Moderate receipts were easily sufficient for demand, which was of hand to mouth character.

Country dressed meat and poultry markets opened at prices about steady. Government market news service reported further price weakening in certain lines of the fresh fruit and vegetable trade as follows:

Local spinach and cauliflower, and California asparagus were in very liberal supply today; and price declines were registered in all three lines. Asparagus reached the low level of 6-6 1/2 per lb. with most sales to retailers around 7-8c. At this date last year, California grass was selling at Portland around 15c per lb., and local (Oregon) asparagus rarely sold lower than 10c per lb. last year. These comparisons are none too optimistic for the market for northwestern grass, movement of which will start in another week or so, from the Lower Yakima valley.

Spinach sold on the early morning market as low as 50c per box, with Alder St. sales to retailers 10-15 cents above this level. This marks the lowest price of the season thus far. Cauliflower receipts were heavy and

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demand was slower than usual, at around \$1.00 per crate.

Willamette valley potato growers profited by the recent flurry by selling freely for a few days around 70-80c per cwt. of No. 1 Burbanks. The Portland market was unaffected by this increase in values though, and little change has been recorded here in the city, for several weeks.

## Close Irregularly Lower In Street

NEW YORK, Mar. 25 (AP)—Efforts of bull leaders to throw a smoke screen over adverse developments in the day's news were attended with meager success in today's stock market.

Reductions of the Baltimore & Ohio annual dividend rate from \$7 to \$5, and of Westinghouse's from \$5 to \$4, were neither as bullish or as bearish as advance gossip from various quarters had indicated, but a check to the upward trend in steel mill output, while possibly only temporary, was a distinctly unsettling factor. Better than seasonal showings in the weekly freight car loadings and electric power consumption reports were susceptible to diverse interpretations.

Shares sold up during the morning, down at midday, up for a time in the afternoon, and off again in the late trading on the Baltimore & Ohio dividend announcement. The close was irregularly lower. Trading was almost entirely professional, and the day's turnover was only about 2,200,000 shares.

# 54 LOANS PAID TO VETS LAST MONTH, REPORT

SALEM, March 25 (AP)—Fifty-four loans were paid by the war veterans' state aid commission during February, Frank Moore, secretary to the commission, announced today. The figure brings the total loans to date to 12,314. Three cash bonuses were paid during that month bringing that total to 23,001.

The amount of the loans received by the 54 veterans was \$111,400, bringing that total figure to \$29,310,625 in the state, while the cash bonuses amounted to \$5,072,085. Of the loans paid Moore stated \$5,602,956.56 had been repaid and interest collected to the amount of \$5,700,769.75, or more than one-third of the funds returned in interest and principal.

The loans to veterans average \$2,395. Moore's report shows, while the average cash bonus was \$220. The commission reported a balance on hand at the end of February of \$44,589.40.

(For head lettuce or fruit salads)  
2 eggs  
4 tablespoons flour  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1/2 teaspoon pepper  
1/2 teaspoon dry mustard  
1/2 cup pineapple juice  
4 tablespoons lemon juice  
1/2 cup orange juice  
1 tablespoon butter  
Beat eggs and add flour, salt, pepper and mustard. When blended add rest of ingredients. Cook in double boiler until dressing is thick and creamy. Stir frequently. Beat well with an egg. If dressing is too thick when served, it can be thinned with plain, whipped or sour cream.  
Strawberry Tarts  
(Can be made day prior to serving)  
1 1/2 cups flour  
1/2 cup lard  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
3 tablespoons cold water  
Mix flour, cut in lard. Add salt, and mixing with a knife, slowly add cold water. When stiff dough forms break off 2-3 of it and fit into six shallow patty pans. Add filling. Roll out rest of ingredients and cut into thin strips. Place four strips crisscross fashion across tops of each filled tart.  
Strawberry Filling  
3 cups berries  
1 tablespoon flour  
1/2 cup sugar  
1 tablespoon lemon juice  
1 tablespoon butter  
Blend ingredients. Pour into tart cases.  
Veal Salad, Serving 6  
1 cup diced veal  
1 cup diced celery  
1 card cooked eggs, diced  
2 tablespoons chopped onions  
2 tablespoons chopped pimientos  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1/2 cup salad dressing  
Mix and chill ingredients, serve on head lettuce.
