Smallest Durum Wheat Acreage Since Year '28

WASHINGTON, Mar. 26 (AP)—The smallest durum wheat acreage since 1928 was reflected today in the department of agriculture's report of intentions by farmers to plant 3,389,000 acres.

The department said the durum acreage was 77.5 per cent of last year's and only slightly more than half the record 1928 acreage of 6,836,000 acres.

The intended acreage of spring wheat other than durum, the depart-

ment placed at 13,902,000 acres, or 88 per cent of the 1929 acreage.

The greatest decrease was 35 per cent in Washington, where winter wheat acreage was greatly increased, and 30 per cent in Colorado, 40 per cent in Idaho and 24 per cent in Idaho, where winter wheat abandonment now appears likely to be small.

The intended decrease in North Dakota is 6 per cent, South Dakota 10 per cent, Minnesota 15 per cent, and acreage of spring wheat harvested has slightly exceeded the acreage intended.

If the usual departure is made this year, the department said, 14,093,000 acres, or 88.6 per cent of the 1929 acreage will be harvested. This will be next to the smallest acreage of this crop since separate estimates were first made in 1917.

Other Crops Estimated.

The intended plantings this year for other crops, in comparison with the acreages grown for harvest last year, were reported as follows:

Oats, 6.8 per cent more; barley, 12 per cent more; flax seed, 4.1 per cent less; rice, 2.9 per cent less; grain sorghums, 6.0 per cent more; potatoes, 10.7 per cent more; sweet potatoes, 28.9 per cent more; tobacco, 0.7 per cent less; beans, (dry, edible) 1.5 per cent less; peanuts, 30.7 per cent more; soy beans, 25 per cent more; cow peas, 29.3 per cent more; tame hay, 1.0 per cent more.

Intentions as to cotton were not collected because national legislation specifically prohibits such a report on that commodity.

FEW CHANGES IN MARKET IN OREGON TODAY

PORTLAND, Mar. 26 (AP)—General character of the wholesale trade in both butter and eggs was unchanged in today's market action. Quotations were unchanged. Butter was steady but demand light. Buying was limited to immediate needs. Eggs continued unsettled by large receipts of off quality and by direct sales at shaded prices.

All lines of country dressed meats and poultry found a good early call at firm prices. Dressed real supplies were well below demand so bids to producers ranged upward another 1/2 cent making quotations 13 to 13 1/2 cents a pound.

Of the fresh fruit and vegetable trade government market news service reported:

The recent potato excitement has largely subsided, and prices at Idaho points, as well as on the Chicago futures market, have retreated approximately to the levels of 2-3 weeks ago. Northwestern markets are mostly oversupplied with No. 2 cauliflower, representing "left-overs" after loading carloads at Roseburg and Portland. Shippers report good eastern telegraphic inquiry today, but sales are slow at around 900 per crate of No. 1 flower. Seattle is now receiving considerable home-grown cauliflower. Lettuce markets showed a weaker tone today, due to extremely heavy shipments, 200 carloads originating in Arizona alone. Salinas, California, district is now starting their shipping season and will soon be loading in volume.

Dividend Cut Aids Bearish Forces

NEW YORK, Mar. 26 (AP)—It took a surprise in the way of a dividend cut to give the bears leverage in the stock market today. Although the market had been able to resist such adverse developments as dividend reductions fairly well in recent sessions, paring of the Anaconda annual rate from \$2.50 to \$1.50 today caused a drop of 3 points in that issue, and encouraged bear selling through much of the list.

The market remained highly professional, and stock was not pressed for sale in any volume. The day's transfers amounted to about 2,600,000 shares. Losers of 1 to 4 points, however, were general.
