JOHNNY DOBBS TRADITION POINTS TO CRACKER FLAG

ATLANTA, Ga. (AP) — Johnny Dobbs' habit of winning pennants his second year with a ball club gives the Atlanta Crackers hope this season.

This is Dobbs' second year as manager of the local Southern association club.

The Crackers had a bad start last season, but even so finished second in the pennant race.

A hole was left in the lineup when Luke Appling, shortstop, was sold to the White Sox last year. Four hopefuls are battling for the berth.

They are James Battle from Columbus, Ga., in the Southeastern league last year; Robert Lamotte, who played with Chattanooga and Atlanta last year; John Ryan, Chicago; and Leo Bader, who played some with the Crackers in 1930.

ENGINES NOW 100 TIMES LARGER THAN FIRST ONES
PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Philadelphia's locomotive-building industry, celebrating its centennial anniversary this year, finds that railroad engines have grown in size more than 100-fold in 100 years.

"Old Ironsides," the first locomotive constructed by Matthias W. Baldwin, a jeweler who quit repairing watches to try building steam engines, was built in 1831. It weighed a scant five tons, and attained the speed of 28 miles an hour on its six-mile run on the Philadelphia-Germantown and Norristown railroads.

Modern locomotives built at the locomotive works which grew out of Baldwin's efforts weigh as much as 500 tons. More than 61,000 have been built at this plant.

OKLAHOMA SCHOOL ENTERS NATIONAL POLO TOURNAMENT

RENO, Nev., Mar. 26 (AP) — Dave Pinkes, Seattle salesman who is charged with the murder of Florence Bennett Pinkes in San Francisco Monday, committed suicide in a local hotel here yesterday by taking poison.

Chats With Parents

ABOUT DEATH
By Alice Johnson Peale
All children at one time or another must wonder about death.

A pet rabbit dies and the four-year-old asks: "Will it wake up soon? Won't it go any more? What's going to happen to it now?"

He is lucky if his first acquaintance with death is an experience no more emotionally charged than the death of a pet rabbit.

Questions which the child asks about death should not be evaded. To answer vaguely and to tell him to "Run out and play, now" is to surround the idea of death with mystery, and so to make it a nucleus for fear.

To answer him in such a way that he feels this is something too dreadful to be discussed is to arouse directly a horror of death he may never outgrow.

The biological fact of death is something which can be dealt with in an entirely simple and matter-of-fact way. He can be told that when the heart stops beating, the animal or human being ceases to feel anything more, that it is as if he has gone to sleep and would never wake up.

Such a simplified, unemotional explanation is usually satisfactory to the young child.

Bereavement is not so easy to deal with. The child needs not only to understand the fact of death, but he needs to be given help in adjusting himself to the idea that he has lost a playmate, a familiar visitor or a beloved relative.

The explanation of what has happened must include whatever ideas of after-life the adult sincerely believes. Unless the death is closely connected with the home circle, it is soon crowded out of the child's thoughts by pleasant daily happenings, and by the fact that this subject is not unnecessarily mentioned.

SPRING LUNCHEON MENU
Diced Pineapple and Orange Slices
Shrimp Salad
Creamed Peas
Hot Rolls
Raspberry Jam
Sponge Cake Delight
Coffee
Salted Nuts

Diced Pineapple and Orange Slices
2 cups diced pineapple.
2 cups sliced oranges.
2 tablespoons lemon juice.
1/2 cup confectioner's sugar.
Chill fruits and lemon juice. Arrange on small glass plates and sprinkle with sugar.

Shrimp Salad, Serving 8
2 cups shrimp.
1 cup diced celery.
1 cup diced cucumbers.
2 hard cooked eggs, diced.
1 teaspoon salt.
1 teaspoon paprika.
2 tablespoons chopped pimientos.
1 cup stiff mayonnaise.
1/2 cup whipped cream.
Mix cream and mayonnaise. Mix and chill rest of ingredients. Mix one-half mayonnaise mixture with shrimp mixture. Serve on lettuce and top with remaining mayonnaise.

Mayonnaise
2 egg yolks.
1 teaspoon salt.
2 teaspoons sugar.
1/4 teaspoon paprika.
1/4 teaspoon celery salt.
1/2 teaspoon dry mustard.
2 tablespoons vinegar.
2 tablespoons lemon juice.
1 cup chilled salad oil.
Chill utensils and ingredients. Beat egg yolks in small deep bowl, add salt, sugar, paprika, celery salt and mustard. Beat well. Add two tablespoons of oil. Beat steadily and add slowly three tablespoons of oil. Alternate rest of oil and vinegar and lemon juice. Beat until very thick and creamy. Chill.

Sponge Cake Delight
4 egg yolks.
3 tablespoons orange juice.
1 cup sugar.
1 teaspoon lemon extract.
1/2 teaspoon salt.
2 tablespoons corn starch.
1/2 cup flour.
1/4 teaspoon baking powder.
4 egg whites, beaten.
1 quart orange sherbet.
1 cup whipped cream.
Beat egg yolks and juice. Add sugar and mix well. Add extract, salt, corn starch and flour. Mix lightly. Lightly fold in baking powder and beaten egg whites. Pour into shallow, greased pan. Bake 30 minutes in moderate oven. Serve, cut in squares, top with sherbet and cream.

The Garden
An attractive design and the free use of flowers about the vegetable garden will make it an attraction to the season long. The use of flowers in the vegetable garden is an old continental and English idea and it is still often seen in the gardens maintained by Germans of an older generation.

Rows of annuals are alternated with rows of vegetables. The beds are raised and kept to sharply maintained straight lines with paths between, and around each vegetable bed there is a narrow border of some favorite annual. Some of the vegetables with ornamental foliage are effectively used in this manner.

Among them are parsley, carrots, Swiss chard, and that useful herb, sage. The gray green foliage and blue blooms of which are as attractive as many of the subjects grown exclusively in the vegetable garden.

Chives give a neat, grassy line and in their season give a wealth of heads of lavender bloom. Parsnips, sweet alyssum, lobelia, Virginia stocks, dwarf petunias, dwarf marigolds and other low growing plants are often used as edgings for vegetable patches.

In the garden laid out in straight rows an occasional row of annuals to furnish flowers for the table upon which the vegetables are to be used in the menu gives fine color and effect. For this purpose centaureas, asters, calendulas, scabiosa, ten weeks stocks and other annuals of compact and upright growth are excellent. Annual plants of wide spreading, sprawling growth are not appropriate as vegetable companions.

A seed bed in some convenient corner with annuals growing in rows ready for transplanting may be established, and from this supply annuals can be transplanted into the vegetable garden as fast as some of the early vegetables have matured and have been gathered and used.

The spinach, radish and lettuce rows or beds furnish an excellent place to move in annuals after the vegetables have done their duty. It is also an excellent idea to plant gladiolus bulbs for cutting supply in space vacated by early vegetables as they can be planted up to July.

Health Talks
ACUTE APPENDICITIS
Surgical procedures in diseases involving the abdomen have been highly developed during the past 20 years.

In many ways operations have been rendered more safe and less crippling, but the surgical treatment of acute appendicitis does not appear to have fully shared in this general advance of modern surgery.

The mortality rate from acute appendicitis is too high. Too many of those who develop the condition die from it. In various localities the mortality rates range from three to ten per cent.

The problem extends beyond the confines of surgical technique and touches the public at large.

It is universally agreed that when a case is seen within 24 hours of the time of onset it should be operated upon. Early diagnosis is more important than refinements of surgical treatment, but unfortunately, largely depends upon how promptly medical help is secured.

One of the great difficulties is that since grandmother's time we have been taught that the sovereign remedy for general abdominal pain is "a good dose of castor oil." This is possibly the worst procedure in acute appendicitis.
