Party Climbs Crags Of Volcanic Peak
LASSEN VOLCANIC NATIONAL PARK, Cal., Mar. 26 (AP)—The climbing crags of Lassen peak, the only active volcanic mountain in continental United States have just been conquered by four prominent residents of Oakland who returned from an adventurous climb to the crater with exciting tales of their adventures.

The climb was made by Oliver Kehrstin, James Nasser, James B. Linford and Robert Strong. Arthur G. Holes, national park ranger, accompanied them as guide. Only three or four other persons have made it during winter months.

At the 8000-foot elevation the party ran into a blizzard that raged around the shoulders of the 10,430 foot mountain at 65 miles an hour. GRANGE HALL (Special) — Blue Mountain, Mt. Fanny, Rockwall and Pleasant Grove granges were represented by delegates from those organizations and from the chamber of commerce met Tuesday afternoon in H. G. Order Work Started On State Hospital

SALER, Mar. 26 (AP) — Immediate work at the state tuberculosis hospital, with construction and improvements totaling about \$100,000 was ordered by the state board of control at a lengthy session yesterday. The work consists of the erection of a main hospital structure at Salem, an estimated cost of \$70,000, the construction of a cottage at \$5,000 and improvements in the other buildings totaling more than \$15,000.

L. L. Dugan, Portland, was appointed architect by the board. Dr. C. C. Bellinger, superintendent, will have charge of the work. He stated the new building would house about 40 more patients. Construction of the new buildings will be completed by fall, the board announced.

A large number of minor items and bids for supplies were considered by the board, at the session.
