NAMED TO FILL VACANCIES

SALEM, Mar. 27 (7) — W. H. Gilmore of Albany and Michele E. Rogoway of Portland were named to fill vacancies on the state board of bar examiners by Governor Julius L. Meier last night.

Gilmore succeeds Ed L. Johnson of Oregon City, whose term has expired, and Rogoway will succeed Roy Neer of Portland who has resigned. Clarence D. Winston of Corvallis is the third member of the board.

Miss Nadine Zweifel will conduct the audience on a trip through various countries in the world, starting in old America at the time of Washington when the minute was in vogue. Mrs. R. P. Tyler's troupe of girls will dance the minute, dressed in costume.

America is left behind for a while and the audience is carried to "Merrie Old England" by Miss Zweifel. Miss Bernice Hess's troupe dance the hornpipe in England, after which Sweden is reached and England is practically forgotten while Mrs. Ray Williams' troupe dance a quaint Swedish folk dance. In Denmark, the next stop on the imaginary journey which Miss Zweifel will conduct, Miss Hesse's Bluebird group dances the Danish dance of greeting. After Denmark the border of Germany is crossed over where Elsie Mevlin Atterley's group is discovered dancing a German folk dance. A little Dutch dance is given by Miss Irene Pott-ratz's troupe when the audience visits the land of the wooden shoes.

CHICAGO, March 27 (7) — Father John Reynolds of Notre Dame university, formerly located in Portland, Ore., appeared as state witness in the Leo Brothers murder trial today and testified that "Mr. Brothers answers the description" of the man who fled from the Alfred Lingle slaying.

Clark Applegate, Kentucky turfman, who preceded the priest as a state witness, said he did not see the man he identified as Brothers hold the gun in his hand, but that he did see him toss the fatal weapon about 15 feet from Lingle's body and not far from where he (Applegate) was standing.
