GRANDSON SEES JULES VERNE'S DREAM BEING MADE REALITY

Star Witness Is Used by State In Brothers' Trial

CHICAGO, Mar. 27 (AP)—The state put on its star witness in the Leo Brothers murder trial late yesterday to testify that Brothers was the man who dropped the gun after Alfred "Jake" Lingle was killed last June and then ran out of the Randolph street pedestrian tunnel.

Clark L. Applegate, of Owensboro, Ky., who said his occupation was race horse training, testified that he was only a few feet behind Lingle on the afternoon of June 9, 1930.

"A man rushed by me and my wife. There was a shot. A man fell. My wife cried. My God, they've killed a man! I saw a man throw down a gun and run up the steps to the street. I followed him to the street, saw a policeman run after him, and then went back to my wife."

"Do you see that man in the courtroom?" Applegate was asked. "There he is," the red-haired Southerner drawled, and he pointed at Brothers.

Four other state witnesses had told of seeing a man they identified as Brothers running out of the tunnel after Lingle was shot, but Applegate was the first to say he saw the defendant throw down the pistol.

Dempsey Offers to Fight Harry Wills

CHICAGO, Mar. 27 (AP)—During a heated argument, Jack Dempsey yesterday offered to fight Harry Wills, negro heavyweight under the terms of the original contract for the alleged breach of which Dempsey is being sued for \$500,000 damages. The challenge and acceptance, however, were not taken seriously by the right fans who jammed the courtroom.

Find Lost Coupe On Engine Cow-Catcher

CHEYENNE, Wyo., Mar. 27 (AP)—Astonished Union Pacific trainmen discovered a small smashed-up coupe on the cowcatcher and front end of their passenger engine when they arrived in Cheyenne from the east yesterday and immediately started a search for accident victims.

Hoover Enjoyed Caribbean Visit

U. S. S. ARIZONA, Mar. 27 (AP)—President Hoover started home yesterday with fresh conceptions and first hand information of the problems which the United States faces in her Caribbean territory.

As he dropped back into the restful routine aboard the Arizona, he had pleasant memories of tremendous receptions in Porto Rico and the Virgin Islands, the freshest being that of the Virgin Islands, which was almost fantastic.

Probably one of the oddest parades of all time passed before the president who saw vendors, school children and native scratch bands side by side in a colorful picture of insular life.

Back aboard the Arizona the president let it be known he had enjoyed it all greatly but had difficulty in convincing himself it had been real.

Immediately after coming aboard the Arizona at St. Thomas he resumed his rest with a nap before a leisurely dinner and talks on the deck.

Throughout the night the ship pitched somewhat in the heavy ground swells. Weather reports indicated that there might be rough seas off the Carolina coast.

If the weather continues moderately good the Arizona should arrive at Norfolk Sunday.

Physicians Move Against Two Laws
