Towler Speaker At Meeting Of P. T. Association

The high school is attempting to teach "doing of things" and an appreciation of things that one is not able to do. E. D. Towler, principal of the La Grande High school, stated yesterday afternoon when he discussed informally how the high school is trying to meet the needs of education before the Central Parent Teacher association in Miss Effie Snider's room at the school. He discussed the four things which the high school is trying to do and illustrated the way in which departments of the school strive to carry out the aims.

The purpose of the meeting was to give the mothers of prospective high school students an insight into high school organization. The four aims of the high school, as outlined by the principal, are to give a student a command of his own language both in its use and in appreciating literature written in the language; and to teach a child to understand and appreciate the history of the foundations of the American nation, giving special emphasis to the civic attitudes.

Another aim is to direct the youth toward some way of earning a living, practical and useful foundation. The high school also aims to teach concerning the scientific world in which everyone lives.

However, Mr. Towler states, the high school is still emphasizing the fundamentals of education, and laying a practical and useful foundation. The children of Miss Snider's room sang "Song of the Lark" and "Snow Dreams" after the discussion. They were directed by Mrs. Ruth Patten. Dinner Muffins
1 1/2 cups flour
1 cup bran
4 tablespoons sugar
1 teaspoon soda
1 teaspoon baking powder
1/4 teaspoon salt
1-3 cup molasses
1 cup sour milk
6 eggs
3 tablespoons fat melted.
Mix all ingredients and beat three minutes. Half fill greased muffin pans and bake 15 minutes in moderate oven. When muffins are to be toasted, they should be cut in halves and toasted until well browned on all sides.
Chocolate Surprise Pudding
2-3 cup sugar
6 tablespoons flour
2 squares chocolate, melted.
3 cups milk.

3 egg yolks, beaten.
1 teaspoon vanilla.
1/2 teaspoon salt.
3 egg whites, beaten.
6 tablespoons sugar.
1-3 cup blanched almonds.
Blend 2-3 cup of sugar with flour. Add chocolate, milk and yolks. Cook in double boiler until thick and creamy. Stir frequently. Add vanilla and salt. Pour into buttered baking dish. Beat whites and add six tablespoons of sugar. Fold in almonds. Spread on top the chocolate mixture and bake 15 minutes in very slow oven. Cool and chill.
Lobster Newburg, serving 6
4 tablespoons butter.
6 tablespoons flour.
3 cups milk.
1 teaspoon salt.
2 tablespoons paprika.
2 tablespoons chopped pimentos.
2 eggs, beaten.
1 1/2 cups lobster.
1/2 cup diced cooked celery.
Melt butter and add flour. Blend and add milk. Cook until creamy sauce forms. Add rest of ingredients, stirring constantly. Cook slowly two minutes. Serve at once.

Woman Tells Of Gunman's "Hobby"

KANSAS CITY, Mar. 28 (AP)—Plans of Fred Burke, notorious gunman, arrested Thursday, to establish a suburban home here to further his "hobby of gardening" was told by Mrs. Lona McAnahan, a widow, yesterday.

Mrs. McAnahan said Burke, whom she identified from photographs, inquired last Sunday about her home, which was for sale. He said his name was Richard F. White and that he was an amateur gardener seeking a place where he could grow trees and flowers. He was accompanied by his bride, whom he called Bonnie, and explained they had come early so they could attend church.

The Whites, Mrs. McAnahan said, seemed to like the place. The prospec-

tive purchaser commented on its quietness. The next day they met in a lawyer's office and drew up a preliminary contract under which he was to take possession next week. Mrs. McAnahan told him she would dislike to have anyone in the house, "who wouldn't be happy there." "Don't worry about that," she was reassured, as Burke placed his arm about his wife. "We'll be happy there."

to the production of wheat if it is to find profitable domestic markets for the products of its farms, the former governor advocated development of sheep, cattle and hog raising as one possible solution of the depression and over-production problems farmers are facing.

Points Out Difference
"In the wheat raising area of the Middle West two-thirds of grain produced is consumed in feeding, milling and seedling, leaving only one-third to be absorbed by the general domestic market," said Pierce. "Here in the Northwest we consume but one-third of the wheat we produce and must look to exports to consume our surplus. Something must be done to more evenly balance our consumption with production before we can expect relief."

Pierce said that he was informed that federal farm board wheat had been sold in the Grande Ronde valley during the past week for approximately 30 cents a bushel, representing a loss of 17 cents paid by the farm board for the same wheat.
