Wife Wounded Him

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Mar. 31 (P) — Declaring his young wife shot him when he returned home at 5 a. m., Joe Swindler, chief of police at Chiloquin, was in a critical condition in a hospital here yesterday. Police were questioning his wife who wounded herself. Physicians held little hope of his recovery.

Swindler, a former prize fighter, told officers he reached his house to find his wife sitting in the living room with a revolver in her hand.

"You're smart, aren't you," he quoted her as saying. He declared she then shot him through the abdomen.

Chiloquin doctors said the woman then turned the weapon on herself, inflicting a scalp wound.

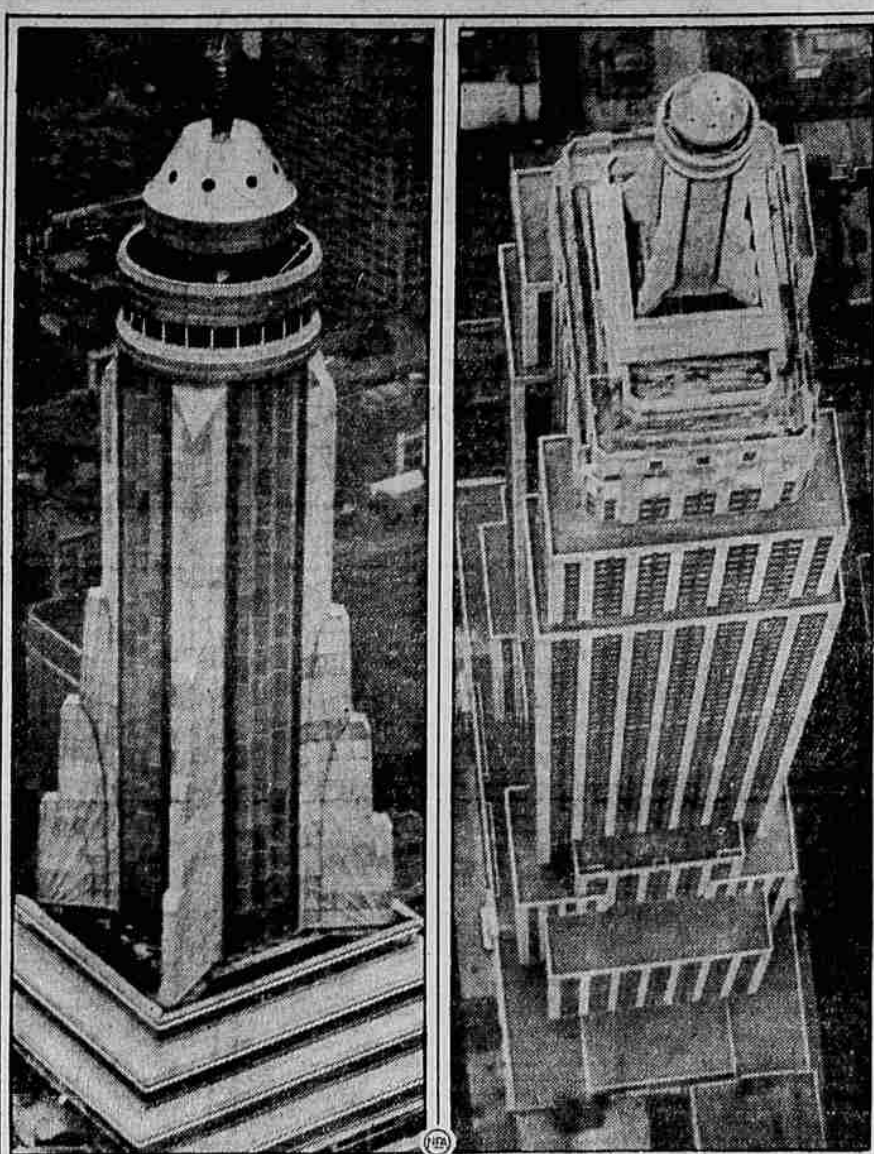

World's Tallest Building Gets Its Easter Hat!



Farther from the ground than anything else ever built by man, the monument-like tower at the peak of New York's mammoth new Empire State building is shown in these airplane photos as it appeared after the removal of the scaffolding which surrounded it. Note, in the striking picture at the left, the tiny figures of two men at the top of the tower, where facilities for mooring dirigibles and discharging passengers in the heart of Manhattan soon will be provided. There are observation towers at the top and just beneath the base of the mast. It's 1248 feet from the tip of the building to famous Fifth Avenue below, and the view at the right gives a vivid impression of the height and architectural lines of the world's tallest skyscraper.

NOTRE DAME
COACH DIES
IN FLAMES

the wrecked air liner and that all those aboard had been killed.

Witnessed Explosion

Edward Baker witnessed the explosion and saw the plane plunge as he was feeding cattle in the pasture a short distance away on the farm of his father, Seward Baker.

Baker found five bodies when he reached the plane. He notified an undertaking establishment at Cottonwood Falls. Ambulances rushed to the scene over muddy roads which impeded their progress.

Rockne was on his way to Los Angeles on a business trip. Dr. Michael Mulcaire, vice president of Notre Dame, told the Associated Press in Chicago over the telephone today. A Hollywood dispatch said he was bound for Hollywood to complete arrangements for the making of a feature talking picture and six short talks on football for Universal pictures. Motion picture leaders were planning to greet him tonight and a conference was to be held between Carl Laemmle, motion picture producer, and Rockne tomorrow morning to complete arrangements for the picture.

Poor Flying Conditions

Western Air officials said their plane was a 10-passenger Pooker, tri-motor, built in 1928. Its departure regularly set at 8:30 a. m., was delayed until 9:15 o'clock this morning because of the late arrival of mail it was to carry westward.

Foggy weather and drizzling rain made for bad flying conditions in this section and several local pilots said they did not care to venture aloft today.

At Rockne's home in South Bend, Ind., it was said he left yesterday bound for California and although his mode of travel was not known he frequently traveled by plane.

The combined success of Knute Rockne as football player, coach and strategist seldom has been equaled in the history of the great American college sport.

Best Known As Coach

There have been men who were as able in one or the other of these departments of the game, but in the case of Rockne he was a star in all three of them.

He was best known as head coach of football at Notre Dame, for it was in that capacity that the success of his teams brought him fame and made his university at South Bend, Ind., nationally known.

As a player, Coach Rockne was one of the best ends ever to represent the University of Notre Dame on the gridiron. He had original ideas about football and when he became head coach was able to put them into practice unhampered. The soundness of his system was attested by the consistent success of Notre Dame teams coached by him, a record of achievement that gave him rank with such noted football mentors as Fielding H. Yost, Amos Alonzo Stagg, Glen S. Warner, Bob Zuppke and the late Percy Haughton.

It was seldom that Rockne-coached teams suffered more than one defeat during a season, the worst being in 1928 when Notre Dame lost four out of nine games. On the other side there were several seasons during

ing the next four years he was assistant to Head Coach Jesse Harper, and when the latter retired at the end of the 1917 season, it was largely upon his recommendation that his lieutenant was installed as his successor.

One of the finest tributes to Coach Rockne and his football system has been the wide demand for coaches who learned the game from him. It is estimated that during the first dozen years of the Rockne regime between 50 and 60 Notre Dame players were engaged as football mentors in other colleges and universities in all parts of the country.

Native of Norway
Mr. Rockne was a native of Norway, born at Voss, March 4, 1888, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Lewis Rockne. His father, a carriage maker, first came to the United States in 1893 to exhibit at the World's Fair at Chicago a product of his skill. The exhibit won a medal for him and so delighted was he with his success that he decided to remain in Chicago. Two months later his wife, son and two daughters joined him.

Knute was thrown upon his own resources before he went to high school. He was self-supporting during that period of his education and worked on a railroad in Illinois to pay his tuition at Notre Dame. There, as an undergraduate, he took honors in chemistry and upon completing his course joined the faculty as an instructor in that subject, and later, in addition, became athletic director.

On July 15, 1914, Mr. Rockne married Miss Bonnie Skiles of Bandusky, Ohio. They had four children.

As Rockne's fame spread with the success of his teams year after year, he came to be recognized by other coaches as one of the outstanding football strategists. His formations and plays have been copied as much as those of any man who ever coached football. Rockne contributed to the development of football in many ways other than as a player and coach. He conducted football schools that were largely attended by college and high school coaches; he wrote numerous books on the game that were widely circulated, and there was an ever-growing demand for him as a lecturer on the technique and strategy of the game.

He not only was a player and teacher of football, but appeared as a champion of the sport, defending it for the benefits that accrued to those who took part in it.

"Football," he once said, "teaches a boy responsibility—responsibility as a representative of his college; responsibility to his teammates and responsibility in controlling his passions, fear, hatred, jealousy and rashness. Football brings out the best there is in every one."

As athletic director at Notre Dame, Rockne built up a system of mass athletics and encouraged every student to participate.

"If football is a good sport for the 'variety player,'" he argued, "why isn't it a good sport for the entire undergraduate body? Granted that it is, I want every boy at Notre Dame who cares to kick a football to have some place in which to kick it."

CORONER VIEWS WRECKAGE

COTTONWOOD FALLS, Kan., Mar. 31 (P) — After viewing the wreckage Dr. Jacob Hinden, coroner, said the Express plane, which crashed near Transcontinental and Western Air Bazaar, Kan., today carrying Knute Rockne and seven other to death, did not burn.

Four of the bodies, mutilated, were thrown from the plane in the fall,

A wing was torn from the liner as it fell to earth.
