PASSENGERS TRANSFERRED BY AUTO BUS

Move Hundreds of Passengers
This morning, shortly after 9 o'clock, five 30-passenger buses left here for the west, and more or less continuous movement both ways is in progress. There were westbound 230 passengers out of here this morning, and 240 more coming this way from Umatilla. The stages, crowded by the emergency and limited to 12 in number, were not honoring any excursion tickets or passes originating in La Grande, and they were not honoring any passes in transit. Excursion tickets in transit were being honored.

Mr. Smith, engineer of this division of the state highway department, announced this morning that all state roads in this section were passable, with conditions fair in most places. Private cars were going through with regularly again.

The railroad was employing more men last night to send west to work on the bridging of the 1100 feet of washed-out track between Meacham and Gibson.

Mrs. H. M. Bay, of the A. A. A. offices here, said she received information this morning that traffic today can cross the Columbia at Hood River and go on the North Bank highway.

Rains Hit Farmers
The torrential rains of the last four or five days came as "good news" to the farmers of the valley, who are jubilant at the soaking received by the unusually dry ground. The moisture, it is said, will prove beneficial especially to the orchardists as the lower soil was extremely dry and the steady and prolonged downpour has added much moisture where it is most needed.

City Manager A. B. Cherry reported at the city commission meeting last night that at three o'clock yesterday morning a survey was made of the high water situation. The water and street superintendent were building a levee at the city dump where the irrigation ditches enter the city, the high water having washed out the head gate. The river washed out the head gate near Riverside park and, as a result, the park was nearly surrounded by water, but no great damage was done.

All sewers were running full yesterday and many basements were flooded.

State Requests Electrocutation Of Leo Brothers

CHICAGO, April 2 (AP)—The final plea to send Leo Brothers to the electric chair for the murder of Alfred "Jack" Lingle, newspaper reporter, was made before a jury in Chicago, Sept. Sabat's court room yesterday.

Wayland Brooks, curly-headed young "ace" of the state attorney's staff, shouted to the jury that the defense had failed to make good its charges of "frameup, dishonesty, trickery" and that the state "has been honest with you."

Brooks said it was difficult to get a person to identify a man when that man's life was at stake and that the state's witnesses who made such identification were all honestly convinced that Brothers was the right man.

"The defense said the state's attorney was a framer, that Pat Roche (chief investigator) was a framer, but did they try to prove it? No. They know the state's attorney is not a framer, that Pat Roche never framed anyone."

Brooks dwelt at length on the testimony of Otto Svoboda, the stern, heavy-set Bohemian cook who said he saw Brothers four times near the murder.

Country Club's Golfing Program To Begin Apr. 12

The tournament program for 1931 for the La Grande country club was released today by the tournament committee, Ray P. Murphy, John Theisen and A. W. Nelson. June 14—Qualifying round club championship; 18 to qualify; sweepstakes, medal play.

June 21—La Grande at Baker.

June 28—Sweepstakes. Mixed foursomes in afternoon.

July 5—Open.

July 12—Walla Walla at La Grande.

July 19—Sweepstakes, flag tournament, medal play.

July 26—Sweepstakes, medal play, husband and wife two-ball tournament.

August 2—Baker at La Grande.

August 9—Sweepstakes, medal play, rotation of any five clubs.

August 16—Putting, driving and approach contest. Prizes for men and women.

August 23—Sweepstakes, match play, mixed foursomes in afternoon.
