

Justice Officers Pledge Support to New Chairman

WASHINGTON, April 3.—Justice department officials yesterday served notice they would support "as vigorously as they know how" the appointment of Chairman Smith of the power commission, whose confirmation President Hoover declined to sign.

The announcement followed closely that by Smith that former Senator George Wharton Pepper of Pennsylvania, would represent him in a legal contest.

The senate appointed John W. Davis, former Democratic president-

candidate, to represent it in the test of its right to recall confirmation. President Hoover declined to return Smith's name to the senate.

Attorney General Mitchell said the impression had gained credence that because Smith would employ a counsel of his own the justice department had placed entirely upon his shoulders the burden of defending the validity of his appointment.

The attorney general said this was "not the case," but that federal attorneys would "give the case the thorough attention which its importance deserves."

Earlier word had come from the justice department that its attorneys would appear in the case as "friends of the court." Mitchell said this plan would be followed due to a technical question as to the statutory authority of the attorney general to appear as attorney for a federal official in such litigation.

The Dalles Asks Salem to Fight Special Road Tax

SALEM, April 3.—Fred F. Thompson, mayor of The Dalles, has written officials of the city of Salem urging that this city join with The Dalles in combatting in the supreme court an effort that is being made to compel Wasco county to impose a special road tax on that city. Salem is directly interested for the reason that its charter, like that of The Dalles, contains a provision exempting it from special road taxes levied by the county courts. The case tests out the legality of this provision.

The suit is the state on the relation of Charles A. Harth against P. Phipps and others, a mandamus

suit to compel the county to levy the tax notwithstanding the exempting charter provisions. The cities of Durand and Mosier, both in Wasco county, are also involved in the case. City Attorney W. H. Brindle of Salem said that if the city council so authorizes him he will file a brief in the supreme court as a "friend of the court."

In the lower court the city of The Dalles successfully stopped the mandamus.

The appeal is to be heard by the supreme court at the May term.

Under the special road tax act involved the county court has authority to levy from one to 10 mills. If the levy is made on districts comprising incorporated cities and towns it is provided that 0 per cent shall be turned over to the officials of the incorporated city or town for road and street maintenance, and 30 per cent allowed the county court for general road purposes.

Easter just wouldn't be Easter without Ham and Eggs, so cook them any way you prefer and serve them with piping hot popovers. There is no trick in making them if you follow the directions faithfully.

Popovers

1 1/2 cups flour 1 tsp. sugar
1/2 tsp. salt 1 cup milk
2 eggs

Mix the flour, salt and sugar, gradually add the milk and the well-beaten eggs. Beat thoroughly. Have ready some small ramekins or muffin-pans, well greased and piping hot. Fill them about half full of the batter and bake in a hot oven (450 F.) for twenty minutes. Lower to 350 degrees F. and bake fifteen to twenty minutes more. Popovers should be crisp, crusty, and with a hollow center and require quick handling and baking.
