

SEALS, OAKLAND DEFEAT TIGERS

Coast League Baseball
Teams Show Strength
Against Major Nines.

The Detroit Tigers today were nursing more spots inflicted by coast league teams on both sides of San Francisco Bay.

Defeated by the San Francisco Seals at San Francisco Wednesday, they crossed the water yesterday to be hoisted out by Oakland 7 to 5 in 11 innings.

The Oaks put over the winning run when Ray Brubaker, pinch hitting for Monroe Dean, connected for a home run to score Eddie Moore. The American leaguers came from behind to tie the score at four all in the ninth. Both teams scored twice in the tenth.

Batteries were Daglin, Cocker, and Reed, Ricci for Oakland; Bridges, Hockett and Grabowski for Detroit. The teams played again today.

Pirates Win
The prestige of the Nationals, however, was not entirely ruined. The Pittsburgh Pirates emerged from an exhibition game with the coast league Missions at San Francisco, winners by 9 to 1. The Missions couldn't get around the pitching of Ervin Brame and the heavy hitting by his teammates. The Pirates hurler was responsible for just one run, error by his colleagues chalking up the other Mission tallies.

Batteries were Brame and Phillips for Pittsburgh; Cole, Walsh and Brenzel for San Francisco. The Seals play the Pirates today.

A little "family" affair at Los Angeles showed the Chicago Cubs an 8 to 5 winners over William Wrigley's other team, Los Angeles of the coast league. Johnny Moore and

Gabby Hartnett got homers for the Cubs. Sugar Sweetland, Cub southpaw, allowed the Angels seven hits. Batteries were Sweetland and Hartnett, Grace for the Cubs; Nelson, Herman and Campbell for the Angels. The Angel-Cub rivalry continues in another game today.

Phillip Page, southpaw on trial with the Detroit Tigers, has been signed by the Seattle Indians. Catcher Alec Guston and Pitcher John Miljus have been reported sold to the Seattle Indians by the Seals for a rumored cash consideration of \$10,000. The Seals obtained Guston a year ago from the Boston Red Sox. Miljus was acquired from Cleveland.

FREE LUNCH IS RAFFY
TO JAPAN FILM FANS

Schmeling And Stribling Likely To Fight July 3

CLEVELAND, April 3 (AP)—The heavyweight championship bout between Max Schmeling and Young Stribling looked in the bag for Cleveland today.

Emil Weiten, legal representative of the Madison Square Garden corporation of Illinois, and Joe Jacobs, manager of the German titleholder, were in Chicago today with the announced intention of obtaining the corporation's signature to a Cleveland contract. William E. Carney of the Madison Square Garden was in New York after declaring Cleveland was virtually assured of the match.

The three said formal announcement of Cleveland's selection would be made as soon as minor differences over the rental of the municipal stadium and other terms could be straightened out.

The bout, 15 rounds, will be held the night of July 3. The stadium, being erected at a cost of \$3,000,000, has a capacity of 100,000 which can be increased to 120,000.

MALCEWICZ IS WINNER OVER NEW YORKER

VANCOUVER, B. C., April 3 (AP)—Joe Malcewicz New York heavyweight, took two falls in a best two out of three wrestling match here last night to defeat Stanley Pinta, also of New York.

Pinta, using a reverse body slam, took the first fall in the fifth round, after weakening Malcewicz with punishing headlocks and rapid punches.

In the seventh round, Malcewicz evened matters with a fall in 29 seconds, using a double elbow and body press.

He repeated his tactics in the eighth round to win the match. Malcewicz weighed 198 pounds, Pinta, 200.

In a semi-final match Stan Burch, Nebraska, defeated Harry Denzler, Chicago. In four rounds, taking the only fall in the third round with a reverse headlock. They are heavyweights.

Jack McLaughlin, Vancouver, and Robin Reed, Portland, middleweights, wrestled a no-fall draw in a fast preliminary match.

Golfers In Action In Victoria Today

VICTORIA, B. C., April 3 (AP)—The big guns of British Columbia and Washington state golf circles boom today at the Uplands golf club here when close to 70 non-salaried amateur golfers will assemble for the thirty-third annual provincial amateur championship over the 36-hole quilling round course.

The last minute entries were received by Secretary A. V. Price yesterday, including another former title holder, Charles "Chuck" Hunter, elongated Tacoma youth, two from that city and one each from Seattle, Vancouver and Victoria.

Exceptionally fine weather prevailed yesterday and many of the title seekers were seen on the course.

NEW YORK A. C. LEADS TROJAN SWIMMING TEAM

CHICAGO, April 3 (AP)—The New York athletic club, favorite to win the National A. A. U. swimming championship, today was out in front with a margin of three points over the University of Southern California, with two days to go.

The winged foot team failed to place any men Wednesday night, but last night puled up 13 points in two events and accounted for two world records. The 400 yard free style relay team of Howland, Dalrymple, Fisher and Walter Spence, defeated the Hollywood A. C. team after a great race in 3:34.9, nearly 5 seconds better than the former mark by a Hale team.

Leonard Spence gave the New York club another first and a new record in the 230 breast stroke, which he negotiated in 2:44.6 to better the old mark of 2:45 by Sarouba of Japan, and defeat his brother Walter.

Mickey Kelly added to Southern California's points by winning the lo-board fancy diving from his brother Jack, of the Los Angeles A. C.

Following the New York A. C. in the point table were: Southern California, 10; Hollywood, Cal. A. C., 7; Illinois Athletic club, 5; Lake Shore A. C., Chicago, 5; Los Angeles A. C., 3; University of Michigan, 2.

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Minor League Depression Strikes Hot Bed of Big Time Performers

ATLANTA, Ga. (AP)—Norcross, the mother town of big league players, has been hit by a baseball depression that has laid low many larger towns in southern minor circuits.

Norcross has prided itself upon furnishing one major league baseball player for every 200 persons in the town. The population is about 800.

Until last year, in spite of this drain upon its baseball resources, Norcross still had enough talent left at home to make a showing. This home team won the Granite league pennant, a circuit composed of towns in central Georgia.

Ivy Wingo led the exodus from Norcross. He was catcher for the St. Louis Cardinals, accompanied John McGraw on his baseball tour of the world and closed his career year better last as assistant manager of the Cincinnati Reds.

His brother, Red Wingo, played in the outfield at Detroit and now is in the Pacific Coast league.

Two other brothers helped put Norcross on the map. Roy Carlyle, now with the Atlanta Crackers, had the longest hit on record in a game at San Francisco. He played with Boston and Detroit and got in the 1928 world's series with the New York Yankees.

Clec Carlyle, a younger brother, made the grade as an outfielder for Detroit. He is on the Pacific coast. Other sons of Norcross are playing in minor leagues. Nap Rucker, for years the star of Brooklyn fans, came from Milton county, across the river from Norcross.

Although the mother town claims that it has as much home talent as ever, supporters of the sport say it is doubtful if a team will be organized here to enter any league. Golf and motoring have subtracted from the gate receipts.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., April 3 (AP)—The Boston Red Sox waited reports from an X-ray examination of the injury to Infielder Hal Rhyme when he was hit by a batted ball in practice yesterday. His physician said his jawbone probably was fractured.

Manager Shano Collins said Rhyme was "in good spirits at the hospital last night, but was ill at after effect of the blow. Dr. Paul Zoll said Rhyme's skull was not fractured as at first believed.

The Red Sox played their second exhibition game today with the Louisville Colonels, American Association champions, and attempted to even the score for a 10-inning 5 to 4 defeat at the hands of the Colonels yesterday.

CHATTANOOGA, Tenn., April 3 (AP)—Vernie Beatrice Mitchell—Jackie's debut in organized baseball that when she's on the diamond, has made many masculine hurlers might envy. LOS ANGELES, Cal., April 3 (AP)—Somewhat alarmed at Hack Wilson's inability to hit the ball as often as usual, and a resulting effect on his spirits, Manager Rogers Hornsby of the Cubs, has ordered the pudgy home run champion to rest for a few days.

Wilson did not appear in the lineup against Los Angeles yesterday, after it was discovered he was so depressed by his failure to hit that he no longer smiled at the umpires. Moore took his place in center and got a homer and a single.

RUSS MCKENNON, Infield Star, In Suit Again

OREGON STATE COLLEGE, Corvallis, April 3—Russ McKennon, of near La Grande, has answered Coach Ralph Coleman's first call for outside baseball practice here. Russ was the regular second baseman on last year's Orange team. His batting and sensational fielding were big factors in several victories.

Prospects at Oregon State for another strong team are encouraging. Nine lettermen will form the nucleus for this year's team. The Beaver team finished in second place in the northern division of the Pacific coast conference last season. Al Brown is the only regular hurler to return, but he will be ably assisted by Woodward and Peterson. The catching assignment goes to Joe Mack, a veteran. Infielders besides McKennon on hand include Captain Buck Grayson and Lee Pennell. Hammer, Ballard and Henzel are stripe-wearers who will patrol the outfield.

TRIBUTE PAID KNUTE ROCKNE DURING BOUTS

CHICAGO, Apr. 3 (AP)—A tribute was paid to Knute Rockne at the Chicago stadium last night.

At the conclusion of the eighth bout between amateur boxers from New York and Chicago, the lights were turned out, with the exception of the flood lights in the organ lot. The great crowd of 24,000 stood silent.

Ralph Emerson, the organist, played the "Notre Dame Victory March" in slow tempo. A sextette from Notre Dame sang the chorus.

At the conclusion of the song, the sextette, veiled, slowly, "Yea, Rockne." The lights flashed on. The crowd was silent for an instant longer. Then the bouts were resumed.

CHICAGO, Apr. 3 (AP)—As a mark of respect to Knute Rockne, all trains on the Chicago South Shore and South Bend railroad will halt for one minute at the hour of the Notre Dame athletic leader's funeral service tomorrow.

LOU BLUE PURCHASED
CHICAGO, Apr. 3 (AP)—Lou Blue, first baseman of the St. Louis Browns, was purchased by the Chicago White Sox today. Secretary Harry Grabner announced. He declined to reveal the amount of cash involved.
