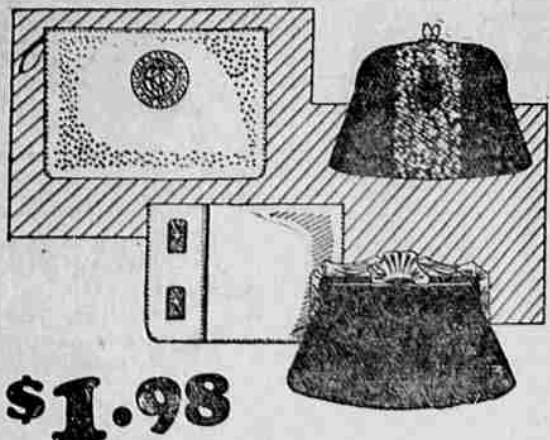

WOOL PRICES
BOSTON, Apr. 3 (P) — Wool prices are very steady to slightly firmer in spite of a lower tendency in the market. Moderate volume of business is being transacted on graded territory wools. All grades from 64's and finer to 48-50's inclusive are moving. Texas 12-months wool sells occasionally at 42 and 43 cents sorted basis depending upon the character of individual offerings. Original bag territory's and finer bulk French combing staple brings 60 and 62 cents sorted basis.

Butter And Egg Market Steady; Fruits Active

PORTLAND, Apr. 3 (P) — Wholesale butter and egg markets opened steady and quiet today. Receipts of both were sufficient for an active weekend demand by retailers. Packers' inventories were centered on grades of butter fit for shipping and eggs for storage.
Demand was active for all lines of country dressed meats and poultry at prices with retailers stocking liberally for the Easter trade. Supplies in some coolers were below normal as flood conditions of the last several days continued to delay receipts from the country.
Receipts of bright weather and nearness of Easter had most to do with a brisk early trade in fresh fruits and vegetables. Supplies of early California strawberries were cleaning up well at \$2.00 a 12-pint crate.
Green peas and lettuce were liberally stocked and quoted lower, peas from 1 to 2 cents less at 15 cents a pound, lettuce at 10 cents a pound. Asparagus is also in prospect; and California cabbage is expected to arrive here soon.
Local spinach supplies were moderate today, after a few days of limited volume. Good spinach sold at 50-60c per box, with a few sales yesterday as high as 70c.
California green peas are moving in greater volume and quotations are declining slightly. Sacks are proving a popular, inexpensive container for green peas this year, in place of the bushel hampers usually used.
Oregon onions are moving at the rate of 8-10 cars daily, and less than 50 carloads are still in growers' hands, according to trade estimates. Best carload lots sold yesterday as high as 60c per cwt. plus bags, f. o. b. cash track.
Yakima potato shippers report considerable western inquiry, but Western Oregon potatoes have a shortage of no price. A fair business in the trade volume of trading. Latest trade estimates place Yakima valley potato holdings at 1,200 cars, including all grades.

WOOL REPORT
BOSTON, Apr. 3 (P) — The Commercial Bulletin tomorrow will say: "The wool market this past week but mostly prior to April 1. Sales have included a little of everything and prices have been well maintained throughout the last especially on secured wools. Greasy wools have been merely steady."
London closed Tuesday with prices at the top and generally 15 to 25 per cent above the last series of quotations and 15 to 25 per cent higher on crossbreds. The primary markets abroad have been closed mostly this week.

In the west, shearing is spreading gradually northward. There has been purchases in Central California, Southern Idaho, Nevada, Arizona and Ohio in larger or smaller amounts at prices equivalent to Boston parity. Some contracting has taken place around Lakeview, Ore.
The manufacturing situation is pretty quiet. Exporters' reports show wool consumption in February showed some increase over January and March is expected to show a distinctly better consumption.
"Machin is offered at about 26-27 cents per adult hair, but mills who have been buying in Texas are not eager for spot stock at the moment. Only about 800,000 pounds in left unsold in Texas, most of the spring clip having gone to dealers at prices ranging from 22-24 cents."

AMTORG FACES BRUSHES WITH GOVERNMENT
NEW YORK, April 3 (P)—Amtorg, the trading corporation for Soviet Russia, which was the focal point in congressional inquiry into communist activities in the United States, was preparing today for two more battles with the federal government.
The first concerns the freighter Anvers which sailed from Leningrad with a cargo of lumber heavily loaded with American dollars, have protested against the entry of the cargo on the ground that it is the product of forced labor and therefore is excluded under the terms of the tariff act. Nevertheless, the Anvers is now on the high seas bound for Providence, R. I., where it will be met by customs officials.
The second difficulty involves Fedor M. Zivarkin, general manager of Amtorg, whose permission to visit in the United States, after once having been refused, was revoked by the department of labor several days ago. What is going to happen to Mr. Zivarkin not even his attorneys seemed to know today.

Daughter Born To American Actress
PARIS, April 3 (P)—Vivian Duncan, American actress, who says she was told by three American specialists that child birth would be fatal to her, has come back with her daughter, born the night of March 30 at Wurzburg, Bavaria.
She has named the child Evelyn Rosetta Duncan. Actress and her husband and the father, New American, who played opposite Clara Gabor, is expected here shortly from America to have his first look at it.

DRIVER IN ARRESTED
PORTLAND, Apr. 3 (P) — Lee J. Ruppert of St. Paul, Ore., was arrested on a reckless driving charge, and two persons were injured in an automobile accident last night. Ruppert was driving a 1928 Ford sedan, owned by Ruppert and Oscar F. Kille, collided with a 1928 Ford sedan, owned by Mrs. Kille, which was being driven by her son, John Kille, Jr. The accident occurred at the intersection of 1st and 2nd streets, near the corner of 3rd street. Ruppert was charged with reckless driving and was held in jail overnight. The two injured persons, a woman and a child, are recovering from their injuries.

LONDON, April 3 (P)—London and all Britain was in a state of suspended animation today.
Good Friday is observed here in a complete cessation of business activities and the holding of long and impressive ceremonies in all churches.
There will be practically no business transacted on these islands until next Tuesday except what is absolutely essential. Next Monday, Easter Monday, is a public holiday and about the only shops which will be open for a short time Saturday are those which supply provisions in residential areas.

Everybody who was able to do so got out of London by Thursday for a long weekend and these holiday numbers hummed along in thousands. They left in the atmosphere of murky dampness which continued to prevail today, offering little inducement to outside activities.
English holiday are courageous souls, however, and nothing daunted, they left well-raincoated and otherwise equipped to take the worst if it comes, although hoping for the best and brightest weather.

Father Is Given Right to Stunt His Son's Growth

LOS ANGELES, April 3 (P) — The right of a father to prevent his son from growing into "a circus freak" was upheld by the superior court in a ruling yesterday that Adolph E. Roome Jr., 14, must submit to pituitary gland treatments to forestall an abnormal growth of stature.
The judgment, made by Judge Lester Roth following a trial in which the boy protested against treatments prescribed by his father, a surgeon, cited the Biblical injunction that children should honor their father and mother and "obey" just wishes. The parents were divorced five years ago, the mother gaining custody of the son.

The son, whose height is now more than six feet and weight in excess of 200 pounds, claimed he feared the treatments would impair his brain but the court held with other physicians who testified that any discomfort he might suffer would be only temporary.
"The boy," the court said, "is not only abnormal now but there is danger that he may become a physical monstrosity, or, as the father terms it, 'a circus freak.' The court said the mother had failed to insist that her son take the treatments as ordered in a court ruling three years ago.

"The mother," the court continued, "has admitted that she has no objections personally to the treatment. The father contends, and properly, that although the boy was given in custody of the mother under the divorce, he has not lost all rights as a parent."
Judge Roth ordered the boy to cooperate with his father, "instead of aggressively opposing him... for there is a strong possibility that such treatment may produce a beneficial result."

"Speeders" Crash, One Man Is Dead
MOUNT VERNON, Wash., Apr. 3 (P) — One man was reported killed and two others were injured when two "speeders" carrying men to work on the city of Seattle-Newhalem power project collided today between Concrete and Newhalem.
One of the cars was said to have been carrying 20 men. The number in the other was unknown. The accident occurred on the City of Seattle railroad line to the plant.
George Washington, an Indian of Rockport, was reported dead from injuries in the Sedro Woolley hospital but the report had not been verified. Jasper Petta and P. J. Wilson were in the Sedro Woolley hospital seriously injured.
