Ah Delth Club Is Entertained

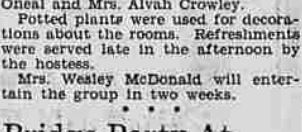

"Girl Mart" Heads Are Held In Jail

SAN DIEGO, Cal., April 9 (AP) — Olive Clark Day and William Jobelmann alleged heads of the Hollywood "girl bazaar," were arraigned here yesterday on charges of violating the state juvenile court law and of conspiring to violate the law. They were ordered held for preliminary hearing under bail of \$25,000 each. Both Miss Day and Jobelmann said they were unable to furnish bail in the amount fixed and were ordered remanded to the county jail.

Defendants had asked the court to make their bail light in view of the fact that the Los Angeles court, where they are also facing charges in connection with the "bazaar," had fixed bail at \$5,000. Preliminary hearing was set for April 13, the same day as for the trial in the case of Alexander Pantages, John P. Mills and Jesse Shreve charged with statutory offenses against Helen Livingston and Allice Blake, young girls said to have been sent to a bi-partisan move "bazaar" directors for a "gay" party at a hotel here last October.

LONGWORTH DEAD TODAY IN CAROLINA

tailored window of the sick room the vigil continued. Doctors and nurses administering to the lying figure inside, newspapermen watching the moving figures in white, awaiting the inevitable.

The doctor stepped out of the house and told the newspapermen the end had come.

Mrs. Alice Roosevelt Longworth, widow of the veteran Republican leader, made arrangements by long distance telephone with the speaker's office at Washington to have the body taken directly to Cincinnati where funeral services will be held Saturday afternoon.

A six-year term as speaker culminated the service of Nicholas Longworth in the house of representatives during thirteen congresses.

But three speakers in the history of the house occupied longer the chair to which Mr. Longworth was elected by his Republican colleagues after 20 years' apprenticeship as a "boy" representative from Ohio, distinguished service on the powerful ways and means committee and one term as majority floor leader.

He was the Republican candidate for speaker at the next house in which that party now holds a majority of only one. Prophetically, Mr. Longworth told the last assembly of the seventy-first house:

"Perhaps this is the last time I will address you from this rostrum. It is only an all-wise providence who is going to determine which of the two major parties will organize the next house."

"With whatever providence may decree, I am abundantly satisfied. If I am to retire from this office I do so with profound gratitude to my colleagues, not so much for having elevated me to this the greatest office in any legislative branch in any government of the world, but more for the evidence of the esteem and confidence you have had in me."

He gavel then adjourned the congress.

Born in 1869.

Born with wealth and position on Nov. 5, 1869, in Cincinnati, his home ever since, Mr. Longworth, after attending Franklin school there, was graduated in 1891 from Harvard. He spent one year in Harvard law school, then transferred to the Cincinnati law school, graduating from that institution in 1894.

Although admitted to the bar, he did not practice to any extent. Instead, he became interested in civic affairs and soon was immersed in politics in the city over which "Boss" Cox then held sway. Despite his per-

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istent inclination to remain "reg-ular" in political controversies, he declined to take dictation from the Cox organization and never was closely identified with it.

Later he served in the Ohio Senate, with Warren G. Harding and formed a friendship with the future president which continued until Mr. Harding's death.

Elected in 1902.

Elected to the 58th congress in 1902, when only 33 years of age, Mr. Longworth first served as a member of the foreign affairs committee. Later he was assigned to the ways and means committee which has initial jurisdiction over tariff and revenue legislation. Applying himself to a close study of these problems, he was in a position to take an important part in the shaping of the country's tax policy.

He led in the fight against the Democratic Underwood tariff and for the Payne-Aldrich and postwar Fordney-McCumber schedules. He was speaker when the Hawley-Smoot act passed.

During his speakership, Mr. Longworth formed with Republican Leader Tison and Chairman Snell of the rules committee a group termed the "triumvirate" by Republicans and Democrats alike. The rule of the triumvirate, irksome to some Republicans and labelled "tyrannical" by Democrats, led to a bi-partisan move for procedure more responsive to minority demands. Such revision was forecast for the next congress.
