Indian Is Shot In Drunk Brawl On Reservation SPOKANE, Wash., April 11 (AP)—An Indian woman, wearing a maroon bandanna on her head and a conventional garb below, told yesterday how her husband was shot to death in a drunken brawl on the Kallispell reservation. Speaking in her native tongue, with an Indian interpreter relaying her words to the court, Mrs. Louis Seymour said her husband was killed after his brother, Joseph, fired several shots from a rifle. Indians in blankets, boots, sash-belts and gaudy shirts of red, yellow and blue, thronged the courtroom as she testified that Louis said as he fell: "He told his brother to quit and save his hurt him, and Joe said 'I mean to kill you.'" Thomas Corkery, counsel for the defense, started a cross-examination indicating he hoped to show Mrs. Seymour was intoxicated when her husband was killed and that she coached her two small daughters what to say in court. Charley Seymour, father of the de-

endant, sat in court with braided hair, boots and mackinaw, as testimony of the alleged brawl between the two brothers was unfolded.

GAS-STEALERS PERIL LIVES OF AVIATORS OWENSBORO, Ky. (AP)—Thefts of gasoline and oil from airplanes here have caused pilots great concern. One pilot barely escaped with his life and those of his passengers when, after soaring into the air he found the gasoline connection on his cabin plane had been loosened and nearly all his gas taken out. The thefts occurred while planes were in the hangar at Sheehan field.
