The books are "The Freedom of the Seas" by Hugo Grotius, translated by Ralph Van Deman Magoffin; "Relations Between France and Germany," a report by Henry Lichtenberger, professor at the Sorbonne; "Arbitrations and Diplomatic Settlements of the United States"; "Limitation of Armament on the Great Lakes," report of John W. Foster, secretary of state in 1892; "Signatures, Ratifications, Adhesions and Reservations to the Conventions and Declarations of the First and Second Hague Peace Conference."

A group of books have been secured from the Oxford University Press and are also available. They are "An International Court of Justice" by James Brown Scott; "The Status of the International Court of Justice," by Scott; "An Essay on the Congress of Nations for the Adjustment of International Disputes Without Resort to Arms," by William Ladd; "Resolutions of the Institute of International Law," dealing with the law of nations; "Declaration of Independence, The Articles of Confederation, and The Constitution of the United States," by Scott; "The Havana Convention Concerning International Organizations," adopted by the American Institute of International Law at Havana in 1917; "The Hague Conventions and Declarations of 1899 and 1907."

Trouser Skirts Are No Longer Merely Fads

PARIS (AP) — Fashionable femininity is adopting trousered skirts. The bifurcated models, halled as "only a fad" a year ago, have marched from beach to ballroom, from salon to street in steady progress. And Parisian couturiers declare that the trousered skirt is one fashion that has a future instead of a past. With beach and dinner pajamas pinned to the fashion map, trousered street skirts have stepped into the style scene this spring. The wool and linen suits which madame may wear shopping show bifurcated designs, although they are half concealed. One couturier places a wide panel across the back of the trousered skirt, another uses a long tunic, half covering pleated trousers, and a third displays a sports costume with shorts worn under a wrap-around skirt. Afternoon tea frocks have trousered skirts which are very wide and full. Generally they are designed of heavy satin, which falls in supple folds to the ankles. Dinner gowns are frankly trousered, and many of these are slit to the knees. There are white, ivory and pale blue satins worn with waistlength jackets of matching fabric, and black net pajamas trimmed with black uncutted tulle.

Certain cottons combined with gold lace are designed with trousers, narrowly above the knee and flaring sharply below, while white chiffons are made with trousers as full as a skirt.

Reports brought here said the bodies of victims were chopped into small pieces with machetes and the heads impaled on fence pickets. All buildings and bridges were burned and rails torn up.

Gunboat Arrives
The gunboat Astor arrived here early Tuesday morning. Its failure to land a detachment of marines immediately to reinforce the guardia here caused dismay among both Americans and Nicaraguans, who are in fear of another attack from the insurgents, who are numerous and well armed.

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while owning a large collection of play materials (dolls, toy animals, householding things and a whole shelf of delightfully illustrated books), does not possess such a thing as a wagon or a tricycle, a ball or any other toy which would suggest to her a type of play other than that in which she indulges. Being an only child, her home is a quiet one. Her parents prefer books and music to more active pleasures.

What this little girl needs more than anything else probably is the companionship of other children, who better than any adult would teach her to run and climb and play rough-and-tumble games. But when she goes into the street to meet her small neighbors, she has no plaything whose use they covet. She quickly learned that there wasn't much use asking for "rides" on somebody else's tricycle or wagon because she had nothing to offer in exchange. Two or three good outdoor playthings would probably do much to round out this child's interests along wholesome lines, and to draw her away from the world of fantasy in which she lives.
