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Commissioner Talks to Higher Education Group

EUGENE, Ore., Apr. 15 (AP)—Wil-liam J. Cooper, United States com-missioner of education Monday told delegates at the first annual Pacific Northwest conference on higher edu-cation, that every college is under fire at the present time. There is not enough scientific data available "to prove anything," he said, so in-stitutions must simply "conform to the party in power."

The conference, held at the Uni-versity of Oregon, will last two days. It is held under the auspices of the university and the United States states bureau of education.

Dr. Norman F. Coleman, president of Reed college, Portland, said indi-vidual study, and student govern-ment, with close supervision over scholastic progress by the faculty, "is the way in which Reed college has built up a strong intellectual insti-tution in the past 20 years."

Two of the unusual factors of the school's development, Dr. Coleman

said, were no fraternities and no in-tercollegiate athletics.

George W. Zook, president of Akron college, Akron, Ohio, said complica-tions of numerous added functions to the program of higher education have increased college and university administration into a complicated and "often unintegrated mass of ma-chinery."

The solving of this problem, he said, is one of the great questions confronting educators.

Other speakers included Howard R. Taylor, personnel bureau of the uni-versity, and Dr. C. V. Boyer, head of the English department.
