Dust Storms Hit Spring Wheat Belt

WASHINGTON, April 16 (P)—The weather bureau said yesterday "considerable damage" had been caused in the spring wheat belt by dust storms which last week swept from Iowa and South Dakota northwestward.

Storms also did damage in the northwestern portion of the winter wheat belt. An acute water shortage was said to exist in the extreme southwest and farmers already were beginning to irrigate. Throughout the country the rainfall was light. It was largely confined to the central and eastern sections. The northwest was generally deficient while the southwest had none.

Warm weather and light rains, however, made conditions ideal for planting.

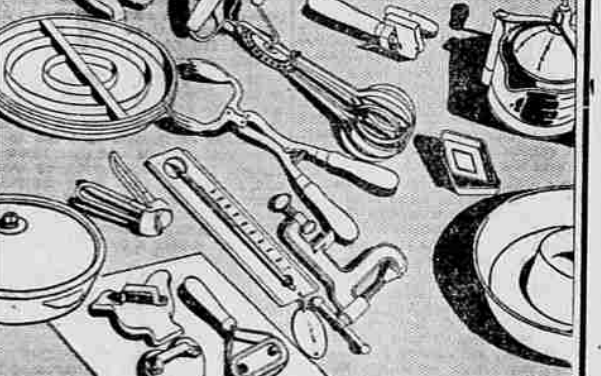

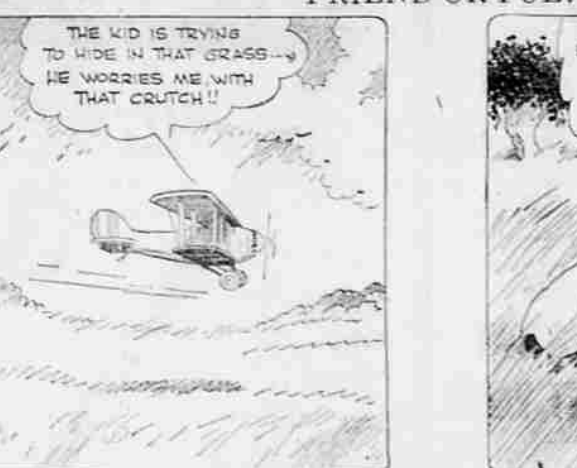

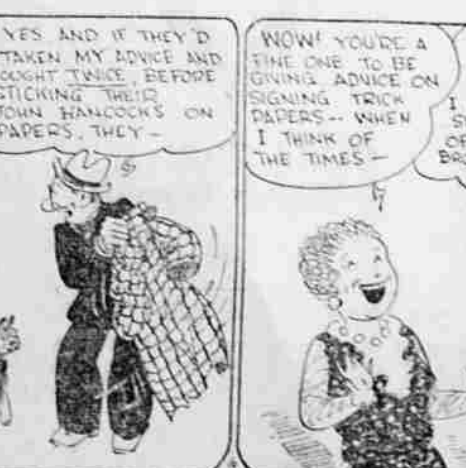
