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Best Style Defies "Dictates" Says Actress

NEW YORK (AP)—A sense of humor and her reputation as a best-dressed woman have taken Gertrude Lawrence away from the musical revue stage. Now she plays only in drawling-room comedies of the witty, sophisticated type.

These two qualities—humor and modernity—have been the forces which guided her career to that of one of the favored stars of both Broadway and Hollywood.

Along with her fame as a revue comedienne, Miss Lawrence began to attract attention for the startling and chic styles she introduced. She was one of the leaders in the move to bring back long skirts, although she insists that the short skirt still should be worn in the daytime.

When "By Candlelight" came along it was decided that she must become a legitimate actress. And when Noel Coward returned from his trip around the world with "Private Lives" completed, he asked her to play opposite him in the leading role.

Miss Lawrence is very emphatic in saying that her style designer in Paris has a great deal to do with her reputation as a best-dressed woman.

I have my own ideas about clothes, and my designer executes them perfectly, she says. "I am not a believer in following the trend of catwalk styles. Why should I wear long dresses because every one else does, or vice versa?"

The woman herself should be more important than her clothes. Her individuality should be considered when she is buying her dresses and hats and shoes. If a high waist line and a long skirt are suitable to a certain woman, then she should wear them without need to dictate from Paris or New York style shops.

"For goodness' sake, let women get a little self-expression in their clothes. Grecian robes were so beautiful because they were loose and flowing, and women could arrange them about their bodies so they best set off their individual good points."

Quarry Foreman Killed In Fall

ROSEBURG, Ore., April 16 (AP)—Gus Rustad, 44, foreman of the Oregon Portland Cement company quarry at Carnes Station, south of here, was killed yesterday when he fell 250 feet after having been struck by a falling rock.

Rustad was directing a crew at the highest level of the quarry when the accident occurred. He was a native of Sweden and came to Oregon from Redding, Cal., where he lived several years. His widow and two children survive.

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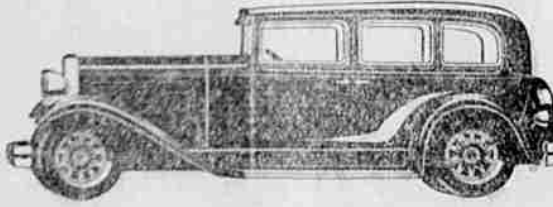
