Menus of The Day

- By Mrs. Alexander George FOR A RAINY DAY
- Escaloped Meat
 - Baked Sweet Potatoes
 - Buttered Beets
 - Bread
 - Apricot Conserve
 - Cabbage Salad
 - Steamed Pudding
 - Fruit Sauce
- Escaloped Meat
- 4 tablespoons butter
 - 2 tablespoons flour
 - 1 teaspoon salt
 - 1/4 teaspoon paprika
 - 3 cups milk
 - 2 cups diced, cooked meat
 - 2 tablespoons chopped onions
 - 2 tablespoons chopped green peppers
 - 3/4 cup crumbs
 - 2 tablespoons butter, melted
- Melt the 4 tablespoons of butter and add the flour, salt and paprika. Add the milk and cook until creamy sauce forms. Stir constantly. Add the meat and seasonings. Pour into shallow, buttered baking dish. Cover with crumbs which have been mixed with the melted butter. Bake 25 minutes in moderate oven.
- Apricot Conserve
- 3 cups diced apricots
 - 1 cup diced pineapple
 - 4 cups water
 - 1 cup orange juice
 - 4 tablespoons lemon juice
 - 4 cups sugar
- Wash apricots, add water and soak 3 hours. Add pineapple and fruit juices and when well mixed add the sugar. Cook slowly and stir frequently until the conserve

Thickens. It will require about 1 hour to cook. Pour into sterilized glasses. Cook and cool.

- Steamed Pudding
 - 2 cups bread crumbs
 - 1 cup sour milk
 - 2 eggs
 - 1 teaspoon vanilla
 - 1/4 teaspoon salt
 - 1 teaspoon cinnamon
 - 1 teaspoon cloves
 - 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg
 - 1 cup raisins
 - 1-3 cup nuts
 - 1 cup sugar
 - 1 cup flour
 - 1 teaspoon soda
 - 1/2 teaspoon baking powder
 - 4 tablespoons fat, melted
- Mix all ingredients. Hair fill greased pudding molds and steam for 1 1/2 hours. Unmold carefully.
- Fruit Sauce
- 1/2 cup sugar
 - 3 tablespoons flour
 - 1/2 teaspoon salt
 - 1 cup orange juice
 - 3 tablespoons lemon juice
 - 1/2 cup water
 - 2 tablespoons butter
- Blend the sugar, flour and salt. Add the fruit juices and water. Cook slowly and stir constantly until sauce becomes creamy. Add butter. Mix and serve warm or cold.
