American Ships Stand By at All Nicaragua Ports

WASHINGTON, April 20 (AP)—Secretary Stimson said Saturday that American naval vessels standing by at all the threatened ports on the east coast of Nicaragua, with orders to protect American life and property at those ports "will remain until the danger is over."

"There has been no change in the determination of the American government not to withdraw from the interior," the secretary said.

"Fully from the standpoint of protection the most effective way to protect the American civilians who have been suddenly exposed to this danger in the forests of Eastern Nicaragua is to give them warning of the danger and an opportunity to escape to the protection of the coast towns, and then for the specially trained Nicaraguan constabulary to operate in the jungle against the bandits."

"If the constabulary now on the east coast is not sufficient for that purpose, there are certainly enough elsewhere to reinforce them against these comparatively small bands of outlaws."

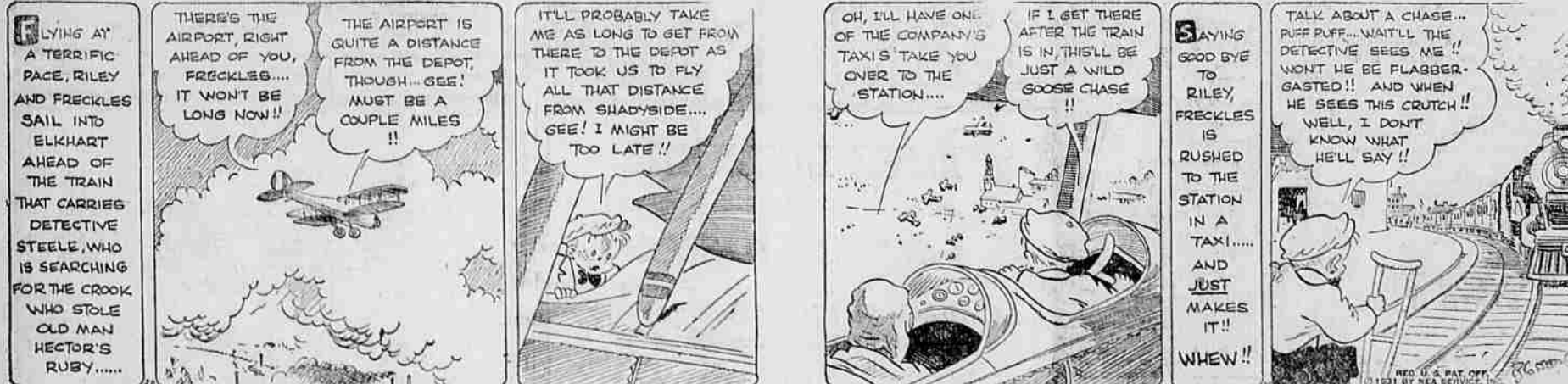
