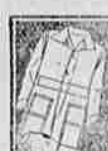

Union Pacific Earnings Last Year Reported

NEW YORK, Apr. 22 (AP)—The Union Pacific Railroad company today reported that last year's net income from all sources totaled \$38,788,000, a decrease of \$10,820,037 from 1929.

Earnings on the common stock, which pays a \$10 dividend, 943 equivalent to \$15.83 a share compared with \$30.38 in the previous calendar year.

Net income from transportation operations was \$35,297,722 in 1930 against \$45,325,568 in 1929, while income from investments and sources other than transportation amounted to \$13,490,778, a decline of \$1,760,719.

The balance sheet as of December 31, last, showed that total assets had risen \$12,252,507 during the year to \$1,208,943,120. Current assets stood at \$48,093,371, a rise of \$2,135,444 against current liabilities of \$46,076,944, which were virtually unchanged from 1929.

Holdings Increased.

Union Pacific increased its holdings of New York Central stock by \$1,000,000, bringing its total to \$50,000,000. The company's largest interest in a non-affiliate, its investment in Baltimore and Ohio, Chicago and North Western, Chicago, Milwaukee, St. Paul and Pacific and Illinois Central showed no change.

The decline in income from investment was largely due to a drop in interest on loans and open accounts due to use of current funds to retire a subsidiary's bond issue.

Freight revenue declined \$20,064,748, or 11.7 per cent, while passenger revenue dropped \$5,148,523 or 19.6 per cent, "occasioned principally," the report said, by a decrease in general travel on regular trains and in summer travel to national parks by the continued diversion of business to motor vehicles.

Two Big Firms In \$10,000,000 Merger

COLUMBUS, O., Apr. 22 (AP)—A \$10,000,000 corporation today grew out of the merger of the International Derrick and Equipment company of Columbus and the Stacey Engineering company of Ohio, Indiana and Pennsylvania.

Headquarters of the merged company, to be known as the International-Derrick company, will be maintained in Columbus. Ratification of the merger was announced after a stockholders' meeting here yesterday.

Cherry And Peach Trees Bloom, Utah

SALT LAKE CITY, Apr. 22 (AP)—While cold nights the last week have held back vegetation in Utah, cherry and peach trees are generally in bloom and farm work is progressing rapidly, J. J. Alter, chief of the Salt Lake weather bureau, reported today.

Rain is badly needed in some sections of the state, he said, where spring plowing is being done. Range cattle are in fair condition. Sheep shearing has started and fleeces are reported in good shape. Some flocks have been started for the summer ranges.

An average of only .82 of an inch of rain fell in the state during the last month, making it the sixth driest March on record. The greatest amount was at Silver Lake, 3.33 inches, while none fell at Escalante.

When Women Carried Men

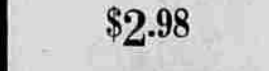
