Government Troops, Victors in San Pedro Sula, in Pursuit.

MANY CASUALTIES IN BLOODY FIGHT

Unconfirmed Report Says Sandino Bandits Have Destroyed U. S. Weather Observatory

WASHINGTON, Apr. 24 (AP) — Official declaration that the revolutionary movement in Honduras was terminated was contained in a communication from its government today to the Washington legation.

OBSERVATORY DESTROYED
NEW ORLEANS, Apr. 24 (AP) — An unconfirmed radio report received here today said the Sandino bandits had taken the town of Cabo Gracias a Dios, Nicaragua, and had destroyed the United States weather observatory there.

WARSHIP STANDS BY
WASHINGTON, Apr. 24 (AP)—State department officials said today that their last reports indicated the U. S. S. Rochester was at Cabo Gracias a Dios. The number of Americans in the locality was said to be very small, possibly limited to two radio operators.

REBELS ON THE RUN
TEGUCIGALPA, Honduras, Apr. 24
(AP)—Government troops, victors in
severe fighting in the San Pedro Sula
area, today pursued a fleeing rebel
army into the mountainous Hondur-

Advices here from the field staff today said that all rebels had been cleared from the Puerto Cortes area and that it was not believed there was any further danger of an attack on San Pedro Sula, key to the railroad between Tegucigalpa and the coast.

The rebels made three attacks on Chamelco, near San Pedro Sula, before taking to flight. There were many casualties, including several rebel officers, but no estimate of the dead and wounded was received here. The most severe fighting of the rebellion took place yesterday, ending in complete defeat of the insurgents.

Salvadoran authorities have intercepted and interned a strong rebel group which was preparing to invade Honduras from a point on the Salvador border. Under the leadership of Ladislao Vasquez and Pedro H. Ordones they were planning an attack on the Valle district near Fonseca bay.
