Croes Outlines Wheat Situation

NEW YORK, Apr. 24 (AP)—It is imperative that the United States be represented at the forthcoming wheat conference in London, C. W. Croes, Minneapolis, secretary-treasurer of the American Wheat Growers' association, declared yesterday on his return from the wheat parley in Rome.

Solution of the wheat problem is the key to revival of industrial prosperity throughout the world, Mr. Croes said. The purchasing power of agriculture, he declared, must be restored.

The London conference, opening May 18 will accomplish much, he predicted, although he does not think it will be possible to raise wheat prices or to curtail production immediately.

In his plea for United States representation, he emphasized that the farm board will hold 275,000,000 bushels of wheat July 1 and the coming crop will mean a large exportable surplus.

"The outlines of the situation are simple enough," he said. "There is a vast carry-over of wheat from past crops, which has depressed the world market, along with the general business depression, until prices have left the producer in a desperate situation. In addition, weather conditions have been good in most of the wheat raising districts of the world, and it is not improbable that this year's crop will be unusually large, with the result that a great exportable surplus will be added to the present carryovers."

When Gene Sarazen won the national open in 1922 at Sikee, he thought it would be a great day and the height of all his ambition to get as much as \$10,000 in the bank.

Seven years later he won that much in a single tournament at Agua Caliente. Last winter he took down the first money of \$5000 at La Grèce.

These two victories have marked the comeback of the stocky, aggressive professional who thinks quite frankly that he is in for a good year.

"Maybe this confidence is because I have the incentive again," Gene remarked recently. "The market crash hit me a shift walk, among a few million others. I had to get out and hustle for the Sarazens."

Besides, my wife, for four years, had told me she wanted that piece of gold plate that goes to the winner at La Grèce. Then, when I won it, she said she wished we had a silver tea set instead."

Wins in Rain

It's an old yarn but Sarazen likes to embellish the story of 1922, when to a fresh kid of 22 he won the open championship on his third attempt.

After the first 33 holes, I went off to enjoy myself and came back late to the club, where I found Bob Jones, Les Diegel and the rest gathered around," he recalls. "I remarked:

"Boys, it's raining and looks like a bad day tomorrow. I never lost a tournament in the rain yet. I have a hunch I'm going to win."

Jones replied: "Well, maybe the rest of us better stay inside and take it easy. If you feel that way."

"I took a 75 on the third round and apparently was out of it. My buddy, Johnny Farrell, was my partner on the final round and all we had with us were the caddies and score—a total of five.

"I hesitated. My caddy said: 'Go for it.' I did and hit a brassie as hard as any shot in my life. The ball landed six feet from the pin."

"That night, I walked around Chicago with the championship cup in my arms, showing it to everybody. At the railroad station, I felt the least they could do was get the champion a lower berth, but the cup didn't improve the agent—I had to take an upper back to New York, tossed the cup in, and used it to bolster up the pillow."
