Mother's Day Is Center of Plans In City Churches

Summer Approaches — Churches Set Evening Worship at 8 O'clock — Interesting Day Sunday

Sunday, May 10, is the day upon which everyone will show his admiration and devotion for his mother, either with a white flower or a red. The churches in La Grande are planning inspiring and beautiful services on that day.

With the approach of summer services in the evening in many of the churches are being advanced from 7:30 until 8 o'clock in the evening. The Presbyterian church will have its services at 8 o'clock in the evening, the morning services remaining the same.

Baptist Church
Spring and Sixth
At the Baptist church Sunday morning, the pastor will take as his subject, "Treasures." For his evening subject, "Love and Obedience." The ordinance of baptism will be administered at the close of the evening service. There will be special music by the choir for these services. The topic for the B. Y. P. U. will be "The Unmet Needs of the World." Miss Michael will be the leader.

Thursday, April 30, is the date for the annual business meeting of the church. Chats With Parents

THE ANXIOUS CHILD

There is a certain type of child who seems to be afraid of nearly everything. His fear is attached to no specific situation; it is rather a general attitude of anxiety.

Such timidity, psychiatrists find, is caused by no single shocking experience but by the atmosphere in which the child lives. It is this atmosphere which is responsible for the timidity which is only the expression of an all pervading sense of insecurity.

Perhaps his parents do not live harmoniously together and take no pains to spare him from the knowledge of their lack of harmony.

Perhaps he feels himself to be unloved and unwanted or he suffers from the impulsive sort of treatment which on one day makes him the object of a passionate demonstration of love and on the next of an equally passionate demonstration of anger and disapproval.

Perhaps his parents are themselves so anxious and harassed about their material affairs that the child unconsciously takes over their feeling of anxiety.

Sometimes the child's feeling of insecurity is due to an over protective attitude on the part of his parents. His days are beset by warnings and cautionings. He is not allowed to enjoy ordinary freedom for fear that he will come to some harm.

Naturally, he learns to regard the world as hostile and dangerous. So over-protected is he that the world is indeed full of dangers. Because he has not been permitted to learn how to meet ordinary risks and hardships he is actually unable to take care of himself.

No child needs to suffer from this type of anxiety if his parents have sufficient self-control to keep from him the knowledge of their own difficulties and if they possess as well as good sense, to let him accustom himself bit by bit to the common risks of childhood.
