Books Reviewed At Group Meeting

In a charming and interesting manner, Miss Mildred Hawksworth, librarian at the Eastern Oregon Normal school, reviewed a group of books by Thomas Mann when the literature group of the American Association of University Women met last night at the home of Mrs. Fred E. Kiddle at Island City. Mrs. Kiddle presented a review of the new book, "Grand Hotel," by Vicki Baum.
Thomas Mann, about whom Miss Hawksworth spoke, is a German contemporary writer and is considered among the very best in Germany, having won the Nobel prize for literature in 1929. "Buddenbrooks," the book upon which the presentation of the prize was passed, was one of the works upon which the reviewer touched at last night's meeting. "Buddenbrooks" is the story of a family for four generations, showing the disintegration of the family and the forces at work to destroy it, Miss Hawksworth stated.
The other work which she reviewed, "Mario and the Magician," is a very recent book by Mann, and is a psychological study, very difficult to understand, of which the predominant qualities, critics say, are mood, magic and murder.
"Grand Hotel" is a small slice of the lives of the "rag, tag, and bobtail" which infest a great German
