

"BEST MAN" WILL WIN, MAXIE SAYS

Does Not Hold Stribling Lightly—Admits Possibility of Losing.

FRENCH LICK, Ind., Apr. 24 (AP)—Max Schmeling, present king of the heavyweights, believes the "best man" will win his bout with W. L. "Young" Stribling at Cleveland, July 3, but of course he believes Herr Maxie himself is the person to whom he is referring.

He has seen Stribling fight, and does not hold him lightly. He knows the Georgian is strong and tricky, but the German expects to wear him down over the 15-round route. He doesn't believe Stribling will hit as hard as Jack Sharkey did.

He admitted the possibility of losing, of course, and said in that event he would fight three or four more times in this country to merit a return match with the champion next summer.

MAY SUSPEND CHICK HAFEY, CARD HOLDOUT

ST. LOUIS, Apr. 24 (AP)—Charles "Chick" Hafey, heavy hitting outfielder, today telegraphed President Sam Henson of the St. Louis Cardinals that he would accept Cardinal terms and would leave for St. Louis from Berkeley, California, early next week.

ST. LOUIS, Apr. 24 (AP)—Charles James (Chick) Hafey, the St. Louis Cardinals' heaviest gunner, still was among the missing today and unless he puts in a sudden and unexpected appearance before midnight and signs a contract he will be suspended automatically.

Few details of the salary dispute, other than Hafey has been offered \$12,500 for the season and refused the offer, have been given out by the Cardinals' front office. Reports on what Hafey is demanding have varied, but the one generally accepted by the fans is that he is seeking a three-year contract starting at \$14,500, with a \$10,000 raise in 1932 and a similar increase in 1933. Another report is that Hafey offered to accept a one-year contract for \$13,500. It appeared certain today Hafey will play for \$12,500, or won't play at all for the Cardinals. President Sam Henson of the Cardinals has set that as his maximum figure and Henson probably changes his mind on such matters less often than any other baseball magnate.

Hafey hit .337 in 120 games last year.

Jack Dempsey In Europe, Man Says

SEATTLE, Apr. 24 (AP)—The present whereabouts of Jack Dempsey is disputed between Royal Brougham, sports writer, and T. S. Michaelson, of Oslo, Norway.

"You're all wrong about Dempsey being in Reno," Michaelson says. "He's in Europe right now."

In support of his claim, he has a copy of the Oslo Sportsmanden, dated April 1, which prints several pictures of Dempsey in Oslo.

The paper says Dempsey has been signed to fight a Scandinavian named Harry Persson, in June, with the winner to meet Von Porat and it also prints a picture of Dempsey shaking hands with Porat on the main street in Oslo.

Indians Feared By Other Clubs In The Circuit

The ball players who are trying to get their teams into the American league pennant race this year are inclined to fear the Cleveland Indians more than several other teams which the fans consider about as strong. And Cleveland's playing so far has shown they have a good reason for that fear.

Escaping the season's first general deluge of postponements yesterday, the Indians won their sixth game in nine starts to take undisputed possession of second place. Wesley Ferrell, star hurler of the fine Cleveland staff, gave the Chicago White Sox just five hits to win his third victory of the season.

Behind him the Indians hit safely 18 times.

Just One Sample

This was just one sample of how Cleveland has been going through the early games. Ferrell has hurled two full games and parts of two others, winning three and losing one. Brown, Harder and Hudlin also have given Cleveland some good hurling. The battery, with the recruit Joe Vosmik testing the peacock, also have been going at a great clip. Only three times in their nine games have the Indians failed to connect for ten or more hits.

Yesterday's other game produced a tight battle between the St. Louis Browns and Detroit Tigers.

Recruit Hurrier Wins

Tom Bridges, the Tigers' recruit hurler, had the better of the mound duel with Southpaw Walter Stewart, who pitched his third full game of the season. Bridges allowed only four hits and Stewart five, two of which came together to give Detroit a 1 to 0 decision. Three successive postponements apparently have sharpened some of the sharpness of the Browns' batting eyes, for it was the first time they had fallen below eleven hits a game.

Rain and cold weather throughout the major league portion of the country caused the postponement of all National league games and two in the American.

Canzoneri, Berg To Fight Tonight
