**Snowden Asks A Land Tax of One Penny Per Pound**

LONDON, April 28 (AP)—Philip Snowden, chancellor of the exchequer, yesterday announced in his budget speech a proposal for taxation of land values at the rate of one penny to the pound, a scheme which is opposed by the house of lords almost to a man.

Compared with this, the rest of his speech was unexpectedly mild, with none of the dramatic measures which had been anticipated for the raising of the £4,000,000 which is the estimated expenditure for the 1931-32 financial year.

The proposed land tax, which cannot be put into force for at least two years because of the necessity for preliminary valuation, would fall most heavily upon the country nobility, gentry with large estates, many of which are kept almost exclusively for sporting purposes.

These elements of the population are strongly represented in the house of lords where the proposal is likely to be resisted to the last gasp.

When Mr. Snowden had ended his remarkably short speech, David Lloyd George, the liberal chief, said the land tax proposal rejected his heart, but he added that he would have no adverse comment to make on the budget as a whole.

Temporary expedients, pending an anticipated general trade recovery, were announced by Snowden as a means of bridging the gap of \$186,830,000 between the estimated expenditure for the 1931-32 financial year, and the revenue on the present basis of taxation.

**Modification Group Welcomed by Mayor**

PHILADELPHIA, April 28 (AP)—Mayor Harry A. Mackey in welcoming organized labor's national committee for modification of the Volstead act to Philadelphia yesterday, said he would endorse whatever the committee would do or recommend, because it is in touch with the common people.

"The people are going to get what they want through legislation or they will get it through some form of violent popular manifestation," said the mayor.

**Association May Aid Lumber Mills By Fixing Price**

LONGVIEW, Wash., April 28 (AP)—Formation of the United Export Lumber association embracing four export groups and 140 saw mills in Western Washington, Oregon and British Columbia was announced here yesterday by L. C. Chipman, head of the export activities of the Long-Bell Lumber Co.

The Douglas Fir Exploitation and Export company, Seattle, the Dant and Russell Export company, Portland, the Grays Harbor Exportation company, Aberdeen, and the Associated Timber Exporters, British Columbia, Ltd., are the affiliated groups.

"The four companies represent and will sell the export output of 146 saw mills," Chipman said. "These mills produce 95 per cent of the export lumber capacity west of the Cascade mountains in British Columbia, Washington and Oregon," Chipman said. "Operation of the United Export Lumber association began last Monday, and it is the expectation of those interested this association will be of material benefit to the lumber industry as a whole and it is considered a definite step toward general improvement in the industry."

"This company will in no way deal with the public, but will prescribe the regulations under which the four separate groups will operate. The organization is effected under the provision of the Webb-Pomeroy act."

Stabilization of lumber prices to foreign buyers is one of the prime duties of the new association, Chipman said.
